




#### FAIR FUN POULTRY CONTEST

Saturday, August 1st at 6:00 pm. This contest is open to anyone who has a healthy chicken, duck, goose, or turkey they want to show. All ages welcome and depending on involvement classes may be broken into age groups and professional and non-professional. There is no entry fee and prizes will be awarded. Categories include but are not limited to: Barnyard Beauty, Largest Bird, Kind of the Flock, Egg Layer Supreme, Bird in Costume, and Team Work. Show will be in the Poultry Barn.

#### **MUTTON BUSTIN'**

WEIGH-INS-Sunday, August 2<sup>nd</sup> at 5:30 pm. Midway Stage Area. Contestants must be present to be weighed & measured.

**SHOW TIME-Tuesday, August 4**<sup>th</sup> **at 6:30 pm**. This contest is open to all Laramie County youth between the ages of 5 and 8 years old. Contestants must be no taller than 52 inches and no heavier than 60 pounds. This contest is limited to the first 100 Laramie County residents who meet age, weight and height requirements. Riders need to be present on Tuesday August 6<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm at the sign-in tent in the Arena at Archer to sign-in and pick up rider number. There will be ten (10) sections with ten (10) riders in each section. The riders with the top scores in each section will ride again to compete for the "Champion Mutton' Buster' "of the Laramie County Fair and be awarded a buckle. Other prizes awarded to contestants.

PLEASE NOTE: ALL NEW RULES AND INFORMATION ARE NOTED IN RED THROUGHOUT THE BOOK, PLEASE READ CAREFULLY.

#### LARAMIE COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

#### I. Laramie County Fair Rules and Regulations

#### A. General

- 1. The Laramie County Fair reserves the final and absolute right to interpret general rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine matters and differences that may arise.
- 2. The Laramie County Fair is a member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) who supports the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to read, understand, and comply with the IAFE National Code of Ethics. A full description of the IAFE National Code of Ethics is located at www.fairsandexpos.com or www.laramiecountyfair.com.
- 3. All shows are open for public viewing.
- 4. Special rules are published in each department and division where necessary. The Laramie County Fair is a Fair that involves the union of two different National Organizations; 4H and FFA, and as such, has to have a separation between those Organizations' shows and rules. Laramie County Fair also incorporates Youth Shows with the need for an additional set of rules to govern those shows individually. Within this Fairbook, you will find three sets of Rules and Regulations setting forth these Organizations' individual guidelines that need to be followed depending on what show you may be involved in at the time. Please be cognizant of what Organizations' show you are participating in and what Rules, Regulations, procedures, and enforcements you may need to follow. Please be aware that the Laramie County Fair cannot and will not enforce any rules or regulations involved with 4H or FFA shows.

#### Refer to individual Departments and Divisions for special rules and regulations.

- 5. By making entry to the Laramie County Fair each exhibitor, exhibitor's parent(s) and legal guardian acknowledge that he/she has read, understands, accepts and will abide by the liability requirements and all policies, rules and regulations of the Laramie County Fair.
- 6. 4-H Educators and FFA Advisors are responsible for administering and assuring all exhibitors are complying with all rules, policies and regulations of their respective organizations as well as the Laramie County Fair.

#### B. Liability Statements

- 1. All exhibitors and exhibits must comply with the policies and regulations of the Laramie County Fair. The Laramie County Fair, Employees, agents, elected and appointed officials will in no case be liable or responsible for any loss or damage that may occur to or with any exhibit. Each exhibitor shall indemnify the Laramie County Fair, Employees, agents, elected and appointed officials against all legal or other proceedings in regards thereto, as well as damage, injury or loss to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor, or any other person or property, or any of the animals exhibited by him/her, or arising out of, or in any way connected with, such exhibition of any of the animals so exhibited.
- 2. I hereby acknowledge that engaging in activities in connection and association with the programs, events and activities of the Laramie County Fair carries an inherent risk of injury, property damage and financial loss, including, but not limited to, physical, financial risks and risks to property. I also acknowledge and understand that the Laramie County Fair makes no representations, guarantees, assurances or warranties for safety, function or my continued participation, in regard to its actions, plans, work, activities, events, equipment or supplies. In full acknowledgment of the inherent risks my request to participate is hereby consented.

Further I do hereby, for myself, my heirs, personal representatives and assigns release and discharge the Laramie County Fair, Laramie County and/or any of their elected officials, employees, agents, volunteers and their successors and assigns from all actions, causes of action, damages, claims or demands both direct and consequential, for all known or unknown personal injuries, property damage or financial loss resulting from or arising out of, or in connection with, my request to participate in events, activities, programs or other actions in association with or at the direction of the Laramie County Fair.

I certify and warrant that I have read and fully understand the foregoing Release. Further, I am REQUESTING TO PARTICIPATE AND RELEASING OF LIABILITY, freely, voluntarily and without coercion and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in activities of the Laramie County Fair and other good and valuable consideration. I further certify that I am 18 years of age or older. If I am a minor, my parent or guardian, fully participates in and acknowledges the contents and effect of this waiver and release on my behalf.

3. All fair participants including but not limited to exhibitors, spectators, vendors, entertainers, superintendents, etc. causing property damage will be responsible to the injured party either by paying for any and all damages directly to the injured party or by paying subrogation claim made by the injured party's insurance company.

#### C. Protests

- 1. A \$50.00 non-refundable fee is required to protest decisions made at the Fair.
- 2. Official written rules, regulations, and policies of Laramie County Fair may not be protested during the Fair [MV1] itself[DA2][MV3].
- 3. All protests must be submitted in writing to the Laramie County Fair Office, be signed by the protestor(s) and be accompanied by the \$50.00 non-refundable fee.
- 4. The written protest must state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered immediately upon the occasion for the protest.
- 5. All protests will be resolved by a representative of each respective show.
  - A 4-H Educator will resolve protests associated with all 4-H Division Shows,

- A FFA Advisor will resolve protests associated with all FFA Division Shows and
- Fair Manager will resolve protests associated with all youth, open class and contest Division Shows
- 6. The decision by 4-H Educators, FFA Advisors or the Fair Manager shall be final. The 4-H Educator, FFA Advisor or Fair Manager may allow interested parties to present arguments for and against the protest, as time and logistics permit.
- 7. Judges may exercise their discretion in the application and implementation of applicable rules and guidelines, and such discretionary decisions by Judges may not be protested.

#### D. Arrival/Departure of Entries

- 1. All exhibits must be in place for inspection by the public and/or judges in accordance with the Fair schedule published within this book.
- 2. There will be NO tack, supplies, equipment, etc. allowed on grounds before animals.
- 3. All livestock exhibits will be released the last Saturday immediately following the 4-H Sale.
- 4. Removing an exhibit, including animals, prior to release time without permission of the Fair Staff will result in forfeiture of all premiums and may preclude future exhibiting privileges.
- 5. Exhibition Hall exhibits will be released the last Saturday at 3:00 pm.
- 6. The Fair Staff or Superintendents will not be responsible for items left or not picked up at the designated times.

#### E. Entries

- 1. Each FFA, 4-H, Open Class, Fair Fun static (non-animal) and animal exhibit in the Fair must have an entry listing on the correct official paper entry form or online.
- 2. All exhibitors, 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters must have a completed exhibitor profile in ShoWorks entered by the exhibitor online or by submitting a paper entry form by the entry deadline in order to enter a class, show or contest and to receive premiums and awards.
- 3. Official Fair entry forms and online entry are available at <a href="www.laramiecountyfair.com">www.laramiecountyfair.com</a> . Paper entry forms may be scanned and emailed to <a href="fairoffice@laramiecountyfair.com">fairoffice@laramiecountyfair.com</a> , faxed to 634-4511, mailed to 3801 Archer Parkway, Cheyenne, WY 82009.
- 4. Late entries will be accepted July 1st thru July 1sth on a paper entry form with a \$25.00 late entry fee per exhibitor to the Fair Office. The late entry fee of \$25.00 will apply to all entries postmarked after June 30th. The Fair office is not responsible for mailed entries that do not arrive by the entry deadline. The \$25.00 late entry fee is nonrefundable and non-negotiable.
- 5. Only entries considered hardship will be reviewed on a case by case basis by the Fair Manager after July 15th.
- 6. All open class static entries are limited to Laramie County Residents. All 4-H and FFA entries are limited to Laramie County 4-H members and Laramie County FFA Chapter members.
- 7. Open Class Superintendents have the right to change entries to correct Age division if they see fit.
- 8. Exhibits must be the handiwork of the exhibitor and must not have been previously shown at the Laramie County Fair.
- 9. Only entry corrections will be done during the designated entry tag pickup dates and times and no additional entries will be accepted.
- 10. The late entry policy does not apply to the Lamb, Goat, Hog and Heifer Jackpots.

#### F. Premiums and Awards

- 1. No trophy will be awarded or sponsored by any individual or group without the permission of the Laramie County Fair.
- 2. Premiums and awards will only be awarded to exhibitors, 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters that have a completed exhibitor profile and official entry in ShoWorks either entered by the exhibitor online or by submitting a paper entry form by the entry deadline.
- 3. Judges will not award prizes to any exhibit [MV4]/animal [DA5] [MV6] that does not meet minimum qualifications of the division in which it is entered. It is the intention of the Fair Staff that no premium or distinction of any kind be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. The rule will be adhered to whether or not there is competition. The awarding of a trophy for those classes so designated is at the discretion of the judge of that class. When there are fewer than three exhibits in any class, some classes can be combined and the judge will award whatever placing the exhibits deserve on the basis of quality. When there is no competition between exhibitors in a class, only one award will be given. No exhibit will be eligible for more than one premium in any one class.
- 4. No premium shall be awarded, nor will any premium be paid on any animal or article not mentioned or classified in this premium list.
- 5. Premium Disputes: September 30 of the current exhibiting year, is the deadline for reporting any errors in a premium check or for a check not having been received by the exhibitor. No changes will be made nor checks issued after September 30. Premiums are paid based on placement on official Judging Sheets, not ribbons received.
- 6. Premium checks will be made payable to the exhibitor name designated on the entry form and mailed to the address provided by the exhibitor. Exhibitors are responsible for notifying the Fair Office of any change to the exhibitors mailing address.
- 7. Exhibitors who receive premiums above the reporting limits set by the IRS will be required to complete a W-9 prior to receiving their premium check. A Form 1099-MISC will be mailed to you for your taxes.
- 8. If multiple entries are submitted in departments, divisions and/or classes that only allow one entry then the highest placement will be paid a premium and all others will be disqualified from a premium payment.
- 9. Premium checks must be redeemed by December 31st of current fair year to avoid forfeiture.
- 10. All exhibitors requesting consideration for adjustment of a premium must submit their request online or by mail on a premium adjustment request form. Mailed premium adjustments must be post marked by September 30th of current year. Neither adjustment requests nor reissue of unreceived checks will be considered after September 30th of current year. Requests made by phone will not be accepted.

#### G. Animal and Livestock Policy

- 1. All livestock are required to pass Vet inspection before unloading animals on grounds.
- 2. Any animal ineligible to show may not remain on the fairgrounds.
- 3. All vet decisions are final and may not be protested.
- 4. All market animals will enter in the appropriate Market Animal Division. 4-H and FFA designations, breeds and weights will be determined at the final weigh-in. Each market animal exhibiting/showing must have an entry in ShoWorks and the correct ear tag number listed.
- 5. All livestock will be checked in by the barn superintendent and assigned stalls. No animal will be stalled without first checking with the barn superintendent. Closing time for check-in and weigh-in in all livestock areas will be in accordance with the Fair schedule.
- 6. No livestock will be re-weighed.
- 7. 4-H and FFA exhibitors are responsible for complying with all State Brand Laws and all Wyoming animal health laws. Exhibitors must be in possession of proof of ownership at all times during the Fair.
- 8. No animal or exhibit may be entered by more than one exhibitor within any given year.
- 9. No animal or exhibit may be shown in both FFA and 4-H within any given year.
- 10. No animal can be shown in Market and Breeding in the same year.
- 11. Born & Raised Youth Show animals must be pre-entered. Born & Raised Youth Show determination WILL NOT be done at the scale.
- 12. The 4-H Grand Champion and Reserve Market Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat will compete against the FFA Grand Champion Market Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat for the combined 4-H/FFA Grand Champion Trophy.

13. Any animal exhibited in the 4-H or FFA Divisions must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before the date specified in the corresponding 4-H or FFA rules. In the interest of ensuring the maximum possible fire protection rating, the Laramie County Fair will require wood shavings as the primary bedding material for animals exhibited at the Laramie County Fair. Poultry and rabbits without trays at the bottom of the cage must have bedding on the ground under the cage. However, because of special health considerations. ONLY Dairy Goats and Breeding Sheen will be permitted.

bedding on the ground under the cage. However, because of special health considerations, ONLY Dairy Goats and Breeding Sheep will be permitted to use the bedding material of their choice. All other animals will be bedded on wood shavings. While the Laramie County Fair does provide some bedding, exhibitors need to provide additional bedding if the bedding that is provided is not sufficient.

- 14. All livestock must be kept in assigned stall areas while on the fairgrounds. Stall cards for all livestock, poultry, and rabbit exhibits must be in place and properly filled out. Replacement cards will be made available for those that have become torn or soiled. Failure to abide by this policy will result in forfeiture of premiums.
- 15. Cattle must be tied out at night in provided tie out stalls or remain in the barn.

#### H. Laramie County Fair Fitting and Grooming Policy

1. Exhibitors must accompany, care for, and exhibit their own livestock. An Exhibitor-is expected to take care of and groom/fit their own animal. However, in the interest of safety and education, an Exhibitor may be assisted both at home and at the Laramie County Fair. Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person doing the assisting is educating the exhibitor as to the technique in fitting and showing. This person is allowed only to show the Exhibitor the proper skill or technique/skill required. The exhibitor is expected to be present and to perform the majority of each technique/skill required. Violations of this rule must be reported to the Superintendent before the animal enters the ring. A decision will be made before the animal is allowed to enter the ring. If an Exhibitor is found to be in violation of the fitting policy, he or she may be disqualified from competition in any Division, including Showmanship Contests.

#### I. Camping

- 1. Camp Space Reservations will open online beginning June 1<sup>st</sup> at 8:00 am. Spaces are limited and therefore they will be assigned by a Only online submissions will be accepted and a drawing will be run to determine recipients of the Water/Electric spaces. At a date determined by Fair Staff, spaces will be awarded using random number selection that correlates directly to your entry.
- 2. Camp space fee is \$100.00 for Water/ Electric, \$75.00 for Electric Only, and \$50 for Dry Camping per space per unit for the week of fair. Exact amount required.
- 3. The corresponding fee must be paid in full no later than July 1st. If left unpaid, we reserve the right to reassign your space.
- 4. Campers and RV's are required to stay within designated camp space. Pop outs cannot extend past assigned camp space.
- 5. No mailed or phone reservations will be accepted.
- 6. Campers are responsible for any damages or waste left in camper spaces.
- 7. Unsightly or damaged spaces may result in cancellation of reservation for the following year.
- 8. There will be no spaces available until Tuesday, July 28th. Please do not arrive before this time.
- 9. No camping will be allowed on the grounds unless proper health and fire regulations are met.
- 10. NO juvenile camps will be permitted. Each campsite must be supervised at all times by an adult (age 21 & over).
- 11. Self-contained units will be allowed to remain in the park providing no waste material is expelled from the unit. Campers who do not have waste facilities will be allowed, provided all trash and debris are disposed of in barrels located around the park, and restrooms facilities are used.
- 12. ABSOLUTELY NO TENTS will be allowed to be set up on the grounds under any circumstances.
- 13. Your assistance in meeting County fire (W.S. 18-5-201 & W.S. 18-5-301) and health codes (W.S. 35-1-303) is requested.

#### J. Driving-Fire-Health-Safety Rules for Frontier Park

- 1. Certain fire lanes as posted must be kept open for minimum safety. No hay or grain can be stored in or within 25 feet of any wooden stall or barn. A 25 foot fire lane must be kept open directly in front of all barns and stalls, and trailer and camper units cannot be left in these areas without maintaining proper safe distance from fire lanes. Any electrical hook-up can only be made at properly designated electrically grounded units. The park will be patrolled daily by fire and health authorities. A warning will be issued and time given to correct deficiencies. A second notice will be cause for ejection from the park. No privately owned heavy equipment will be allowed on the grounds (i.e. tractors, loaders, etc.)
- 2. Any electrical equipment used by an exhibitor at Laramie County Fair must be UL approved and meet National Electrical code.
- 3. For your safety as well as others-BICYCLES AND DOGS WILL ONLY BE ALLOWED IN DESIGNATED AREAS. NO PETS OR BICYCLES IN LIVESTOCK BARN OR EXHIBIT HALL. Service animals welcome. According to County Ordinance W.S. 11-31-301 or W.S. 11-31- 107, If a dog or cat is found to be a public nuisance within the meaning of this article, the owner shall be subject to the penalties as provided for in Article V of this resolution and any other penalty imposed by applicable law, ordinance or regulation. Due to this, we ask that all dogs be kept on a leash while on public property.
- 4. No vehicles will be allowed in or around the barns between 8 am. Monday morning and the conclusion of the 4-H Sale on Saturday.
- 5. Public use of ATV's (All-Terrain Vehicle), RUV's (Recreational Utility Vehicle) and Golf Carts at the Archer Fairgrounds with the exception of Fair Staff Official Use and Emergency Personnel is banned.
- 6. Curfew will be 10:30 p.m. on all nights.
- 8. No alcohol allowed in the barns and must be contained within 50' of the campground

#### K. Superintendents

1. Barn and Division Superintendents, as Laramie County Fair representatives, shall have charge of the department assigned to them. The Superintendent will have responsibility of the stalls, pens, or display spaces in their department. Arrangement of pens, stalls, and exhibit space will be under their supervision. It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to inform the judges, in their department, of the policies governing the shows and awards before judging begins. Each Superintendent is responsible with caring for and posting the judging books of their department. They must see that all placings and awards are duly and properly entered and awarded. It is the responsibility of the Superintendent to insure that upon completion of the show/contest that the original judging book is immediately submitted to the Fair Office.

#### L. Herdsmanship

The purpose of Herdsmanship is to encourage exhibitors in developing and maintaining clean and presentable stalling areas as well as demonstrating good animal husbandry and welfare. It also promotes pride and enthusiasm for the industry and rewards those exhibitors that achieve this purpose. Herdsmanship duties are a primary responsibility of the livestock exhibitor.

Herdsmanship Awards: 100% in any species=\$25; 95% in any species=\$15; 90% in any species=\$5

There will also be a "Supreme Exhibitor" winner of each species that will receive a banner. This will be given to the exhibitor that goes above and beyond in Herdsmanship.

**Judging:** Judging will be completed by the Herdsmanship Superintendent along with the assistance of a Herdsmanship committee made up of 2 additional members. The Herdsmanship contest will begin at the time the division of animals is to be in place and ends when animal exhibits are released. Judging for Herdsmanship may take place any time between 7:00 am and 9:00 pm.

Herdsmanship will be judged on the following criteria:

Animals: (15 Points) Clean at all times with proper grooming, feed, bedding, and care apparent, properly penned and secured. Appear healthy and free of disease or insect infestation.

Stalls: (25 Points) Clean and neat, clean bedding, full water bucket, feed and feed pans and buckets clean and in place, no excessive manure in stall area, stall cards/exhibitor signs clearly in place. Project presentation boards, posters, etc. are highly encouraged. This is your opportunity to educate the public about your project!

Tack/Feed Area: (10 Points) Kept clean and neatly arranged, grooming and tie-out areas kept clean, personal items out of sight or neatly stored.

Alleyways: (25 Points) Exhibitors designated alleys and commons areas kept clean, free of equipment, loose dirt and dust kept under control with proper sweeping and/or sprinkling, no manure in piles.

**Exhibitors: (25 Points)** Proper courtesy and conduct shown by exhibitors at all times and in all places including with the public and other exhibitors. All exhibitors are expected to participate in Herdsmanship.

Any animals not meeting general health or Herdsmanship standards can/will be identified to the species Superintendent. At which point, a decision will be made on whether the animal(s) will be removed from the grounds.

All stalls must be cleaned before leaving the grounds. If stalls are left uncleaned, the Laramie County Fair reserves the right to hold all premium money from that exhibitor.

#### FFA GENERAL & LIVESTOCK RULES



#### FFA Advisors:

Ty Berry, Cheyenne-High Plains FFA Craig Spatz, Burns FFA Joe Allen, Cheyenne- Frontier FFA Brian Cox, Pine Bluffs FFA Jill Nolan, Cheyenne- Big Country FFA

- 1. All steers and Market heifers will be tagged and recorded by scheduled tagging dates of the current year. Change of ownership papers to be effective on or before Feb. 1 of the current year.
- 2. All exhibits must be owned by members in good standing from a Laramie County FFA Chapter. All exhibits must be taken possession of and student will provide daily care of his/her project. Proof of ownership may be required. Ownership of lambs and swine must be declared by June first of current year. These exhibits must be worthy of competition. It shall be at the discretion of the judge whether to award premium, a ribbon only, or no award at all. All agronomy entries exhibited for competition must have been grown by a member of his own project or be prepared as a supplement practice under the FFA advisor's supervision.
- 3. FFA members are expected to take care of, groom and fit their own animal(s) at Fair. In the interest of safety and education, a member may be assisted by other Laramie County 4-H/FFA members/advisors, as well as immediate family. Immediate family is defined as parents, grandparents, sister/brother only. Families will be allocated 3 wristbands for immediate family members. Only family members with wristbands will be allowed to help FFA members. Please remember that Fair is an educational experience. The exhibitor is expected to perform the majority of fitting procedures on their own.

FFA advisors will monitor fitting and preparation prior to the start of each show and will deal with any violations at the time. Any protests must be reported to an Ag teacher before the animal enters the ring.

In the event of violation of the above, consequences may include:

- 1. Violator may be asked to leave the show.
- 2. Dismissal of Exhibitor from the show.
- 4. No adult, other than clerks, shall be within 10 feet of the judge during judging. Exhibitors are required to keep the stall and alleys clean and policed at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums. Exhibits are expected to be ready to show when the class is called. The schedule will be maintained regardless of other commitments of members.
- 5. Registration papers of proof of applications must be available for male breeding stock. Registration papers are not required on female breeding stock in the sheep, swine or dairy divisions. Any female animal entered in a breeding class must show predominance of the breed.
- 6. All animals shown in the FFA section of the Laramie County Fair market classes must be eligible for the Kiwanis Sale of Champions and must have been weighed and tagged prior to being shown. Proof of ownership may be required.
- 7. Any exhibitor may receive a maximum of two premiums in any lot, regardless of entries.
- 8. FFA members will abide and follow all Laramie County Fair general rules and regulations.
- 9. All entries are final at weigh-in.
- 10. Proof of ownership (horse ID form and picture) must be turned in to the Fair Office and on file with the chapter advisor by June 1 of the current year. If a horse is registered with a breed association, the registration must be in chapter member and/or immediate family or guardian's name. Member must have proof of ownership. New ownership and possession of horses must be before May 1 of current year. Leased horses are allowed under county and state rules.

#### **USDA WHOLESOME MEAT**

The Laramie County Fair endorses and supports the USDA Wholesome Meat Act and insists exhibitors are in compliance, exhibitors of all market animals (beef, sheep, swine, market goats, poultry and rabbits) must certify their compliance with manufacturer's pre-market withdrawal periods specified for any and all medications, drugs, pesticides or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited. Certification will be requested upon arrival at weigh-in at the County Fair.

All "Wholesome Meat Assurance Act" rules and regulations must be adhered to. The seller will be personally responsible for any animal which may be condemned because of chemical misuse. Any cost to prove or disprove the use of medications, tranquilizers, and/or injectable substances will be borne by the exhibitor. If proven guilty, the exhibitor will be permanently barred from the livestock sale.

#### **KIWANIS LIVESTOCK SALE**

1. The Kiwanis Sale will consist of the following categories: Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Sheep, Market Goats, and Market Poultry. Any member may sell up to 2 animals, but they must represent different categories as outlined above. The sale will consist of 10 market beef, 10 market swine, 10 market sheep, 3 market

goats and 4 market birds. In the beef, swine, and sheep categories, the Champion and reserve Champion in each of five weight divisions will be included in the sale. The Champion and Reserve Champion Market Goats will be included in the sale. The Champion Market Pen of 3 Broilers/Fryers, Champion Market Turkey, Champion Market Duck, and Champion Market Goose (less than 26 weeks) will be included in the sale.

- 2. The first duplication follows the Champion, the second duplication will follow the Reserve champion, and the other duplications will start with the heaviest division and move in order to the lightweight division. However, no fourth place division animals will sell before the third place division animals are sold. If the Champions and Reserve Champions come from that same division, only the first duplication will come from that division. The judge will determine division placing from class winners.
- 3. In situations where a member qualifies more than one animal per category, the following duplication process will be used: In divisions with more than one class, all 1st and 2nd place class winners will come together and be placed within the division. This division placing will then be used to determine duplicates for the sale. Sale Order: First duplication follows the champion; second duplication will follow the reserve champion. Other duplications will start with the heaviest division and move in order to lightweight division, however, no fourth-place animals will sell until all third-place animals are sold. If Champions and Reserve Champions come from the same division, only the first duplication will come from that division.
- 4. FFA Exhibitors will complete Kiwanis sale forms immediately following the selection of the overall champions of each market show.
- 5. Members qualifying more than 1 animal per category are required to sell the highest placing animal. Overall Champions and Overall Reserve Champions will be sold before Division Champions and Division Reserve Champions. Division Champions will be sold before Reserve Division Champions.
- 6. The duplication process for poultry will be goose, turkey, duck, chickens. If the same exhibitor qualifies in more than one category they will be required to sell the category that comes first in this order.

#### **4-H ANIMAL PROJECT RULES & REGULATIONS**

- 1. You must turn in your paperwork for State Fair to the Extension Office by August 6<sup>th</sup> at 10 AM for all animals except horses. Horse entries are due by 5pm on Aug. 6<sup>th</sup>
- 2. ABUSE OR UNETHICAL TREATMENT OF ANY ANIMAL IN OR OUT OF THE ARENA WILL NOT BE TOLERATED! This shall include, but is not limited to, drenching, spanking, beating, kicking, lifting, or any type of abusive force.
- 3. Market Animal Buyers put your picture up as a representative of 4-H. Wear clean clothes; no T-shirts or shorts may be worn in sale pictures. Pictures will be taken during the fair. Always remember you are representing 4-H and your appearance should illustrate your 4-H pride.
- 4. All exhibitors must notify the 4-H Sale Committee as to which animal they are selling in the sale by 5:00 PM on Thursday, August 6<sup>th</sup>, 2020. All animals sold must be legally owned by the 4-H member In accordance with species ownership deadlines.
- 5. 4-H members must accompany and personally exhibit their own livestock. In case they need help, they may have other Laramie County 4-H members assist them.
- 6. All Adults, except for those qualified to be in the show ring, must remain outside the show ring while the show is underway. Adults may not coach participants in the ring or interact with the judge for the duration of the show.
- 7. 4-H members are expected to take care of, groom and fit their own animal(s) at Fair. However, in the interest of safety and education, a member may be assisted by other Laramie County 4-H/FFA members, Laramie County 4-H leaders as well as immediate family. Immediate family is defined as parents, grandparents, sister/brother only. Families will be allocated 3 wristbands for immediate family members. Only family members with wristbands will be allowed to help 4-H members. Please remember that Fair is an educational experience.

In the event of violation of the above, consequences may include:

- 1) Dropping the exhibitor in ribbon placing
- 2) Violator may be asked to leave the show
- 3) Dismissal of Exhibitor from the show.

Violations should be reported to Superintendents before the animal enters the ring.

- 8. All livestock must be owned by the individual members in compliance with the following dates:
  - a. Market Beef Ownership Deadline-February 1st
  - b. Dog ID Forms- May 1st
  - c. Market Sheep, Goats, & Swine Ownership Deadline-June 1st
  - d. Horse Safety Certification Completion-Please see Horse Section, dates posted in the 4-H newsletter and emails.
- 9. All Sheep and Goats must have USDA/APHIS Scrapie Identification tags in place prior to tagging.
- 10. In June, 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service, involving 4-H and FFA youth, was reviewed and amended to read as follows: "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised occupational experience program in Vocational Agriculture or as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project."
- 11. All animals must be designated as **Market** or **Breeding**. Animals may not be shown in both areas.
- 12. All animals must be declared 4-H or FFA before stepping on the scale.
- 13. Once animals leave the weigh-in holding pen no changes will be made to their weight, breed, market/breeding designation, or 4-H/FFA status. No animals will be re-weighed.
- 14. 4-H Members are expected to follow the 4-H dress code or dress code required for their specific show. Clothing and/or accessories that pose a safety concern should not be a worn during animal events. If show management considers an item to be a safety risk to the exhibitor or others they can ask that the item be removed or replaced.
- 15. Youth age for all 4-H events is calculated as their "4-H Age" which is their age on Jan. 1 of the current 4-H year. Age groups are broken down as follows: Cloverbud-Age 5-7 on Jan. 1, Junior Age 8-10 on Jan. 1, Intermediate- Age 11-13 on Jan. 1, Senior- Age 14-18 on Jan. 1. Cloverbuds are non-competitive and can only participate in certain 4-H events during fair. Please see the 4-H Cloverbud Information Sheet or contact the Extension Office for more information on Cloverbud participation.

- 16. All 4-H competitive events are open to juniors, intermediates, and seniors. If you have questions about which age group to enter contact the Extension Office before the entry deadline.
- 17. 4-H Showmanship
  - 4-H members competing in 4-H showmanship in one species contest are not precluded from competing in the same species contest in FFA.
  - Showmanship exhibitors must compete with their own animals.
  - Preparation and showing of animals must be consistent with the rules in the livestock section.
  - No boars, stallions, beef bulls, or bucks (goats), or other intact males will be allowed in any showmanship event. No lactating animals will be shown except for dairy animals. Cats and Dogs are exempt from this rule but should refer to individual rules in the appropriate species sections below.
  - Judging will be on the basis of exhibitor's ability to present their animal for judging including the movement and positioning of the animal, as well as
    condition and cleanliness of the animal as it relates to being ready for show. Mannerisms, conduct of the showman, and industry knowledge are also
    included.
  - All showmanship classes must be pre-entered.
- 18. For additional 4-H specific rules and recommendations please refer to the 4-H Newsletter or the 4-H Update Emails.
- 19. To verify entries at your event please bring a copy of your ShoWorks online entry receipt or a copy of your verified paper entry to all contests and events.

#### **4-H LIVESTOCK SALE**

Chairman: Mike Olson

Each market beef, sheep, goat, poultry, rabbit and swine exhibitor may sell one qualified animal. Only 4-Hers who have two Overall Grand and /or Reserve Grand Champion Animals may sell two animals in the livestock sale. (For example, if a 4-H member has an Overall Grand Champion Steer and Overall Reserve Champion Lamb, he/she may sell both animals). (Member who has the grand Champion Turkey and a breed champion steer may only sell one animal). No member will be allowed to sell more than two animals under any circumstances. Market poultry exhibitors will have a chance to sell in the sale if their animal is determined to be market ready, of acceptable quality, and this is the only animal they have in the sale; the market poultry judge will make this determination.

Sale order is to be determined by the sale committee with the species champions selling first and then going in rank of placing. The animal sold in the sale must be the animal delivered to the buyer. If a member wishes to keep an animal they should not enter it into the sale.

All exhibitors:

- Must have their beef, sheep, goats and swine tagged with a state ID tag. Health and ownership papers will be checked at tagging.
- · Follow market division rules for each of their species
- Must turn in their sale card by Thursday at 5:00, August 6, 2020
- Sheep and Beef exhibitors must turn in ownership paper to the brand inspectors Friday, August 7, 2020 in beef barn.
- <u>All sellers</u> must take their animal through the sale ring (Must have approval from the committee if you cannot go through the sale with your animal. Notice not very many of these approved.)
- Must have completed the 4-H Quality Assurance Training for their age division.
- Contact potential buyers and thank the buyers following the sale.
- All buyer thank you cards must be turned into the 4-H office by 5 pm on Thursday, August 6<sup>th</sup> or the youth will not be allowed to sell their animal.
- · Pictures need to be taken with the on-site photographers for presentation to the buyers

To maintain top quality livestock available for the sale, the following weight limits have been established:

Beef: 1025 lbs. minimum and 1450 lbs. maximum

Beef Lowline & Miniature Breeds: Minimum 650 lbs and under 47" tall

Sheep: 90 lbs. minimum and 175 lbs. maximum Swine: 210 lbs. minimum and 285 lbs. maximum Goats: 50 lbs. minimum and 150 lbs. maximum

\*All animals will only go across the scales once at the fair weigh in. You must declare 4-H or FFA at that time. If you have a dispute about your animal's weight you are not to leave the weighing area and you need to report to the person in charge at the scales immediately. Once you leave the weigh-in holding area no changes will be made to market/breeding, weight, 4-H/FFA, or breed. If your animal does not meet the minimum or maximum limits it cannot be sold in the 4-H Livestock Sale. Animals will be sold by the head rather than by the pound. According to standard auction procedure, a commission will be deducted from each consignors check to cover the cost of advertising, supplies, recognition of buyers and volunteers, etc. Commissions are:

- 2% beef
- 5% swine, sheep and goats
- 10% poultry and rabbits
- o Animals on medication, sick animals, and animals dismissed from the fair and obviously inferior quality animals will not be allowed to sell.
- o All 4-H members must complete 4-H Livestock Quality Assurance for their respective age group by the deadline advertised in the 4-H newsletter and updates to be eligible to sell
- o Members may NOT buy their animals back at the time of the 4-H sale. Once the animals have been sold they become the property of the buyer.
- The 4-H Sale Committee and 4-H member will make arrangements for the delivery of the animals. Every precaution will be taken for safe delivery; however, liability is changed to the buyer when sold. State Fair Animals once an animal is sold at the sale, it becomes the 4-H member's responsibility to transport the animals to the designated processor on the predetermined dates following State Fair. All resale animals reserved for state fair need to be delivered to LCCC the day they are released from State Fair.
- o Anyone selling in the 4-H Livestock Sale must have proof of ownership for their animals.
- o Any questions about the 4-H Livestock Sale after fair should be directed to the sale chairman and the 4-H educator.

**Premium Checks**: Premium checks will be made payable to the exhibitor name designated on the entry form and mailed to the address provided by the exhibitor. **Change of Mailing Address**: Exhibitors are responsible for notifying the Fair Office of any change to the Exhibitor's mailing address.

W-9 Requirements: Exhibitors who receive premiums above the reporting limit set by the IRS will be required to complete a W-9 prior to receiving their premium check. You will be mailed a Form 1099-Misc for your taxes.

Premium Disputes: <u>September 30 of the current exhibiting year</u>, is the deadline for reporting any errors in a premium check or for a check not having been received by the exhibitor. No changes will be made nor checks issued after September 30. Premiums are paid based on placement on official Judging Sheets not ribbons received.

**Special note for Departments and Divisions allowing only one entry per Class**: If multiple entries are submitted in one class then the highest placement will be paid a premium and all others will be disqualified from a premium payment. Departments and Divisions allowing only one entry per class are noted in the rules for each.

All rules and expectations for 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Cat Show.

- The "Household Pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.
- A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must also bring cage or carrier and litter box for their cats/kittens.
- All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with pants or skirts. No shorts allowed.

#### **Health Requirements**

Cats must have current rabies and distemper, and feline leukemia shots are strongly suggested. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required. Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

#### **Rules and Regulations**

- 4-H members qualify to enter the State 4-H Dog Show by showing in their county 4-H dog show AND:
- Showmanship youth competed in showmanship at county fair or the county 4-H Educator approved the youth.
- Obedience received a qualifying score of (170) or above.
- 4-H members participating in the dog project may use co-owned dogs (owned by the immediate family). The member must have sole care, training and showing of that dog for the current 4-H year.
- Ownership: The dog lives in the same residence with the 4-H member and is owned by the 4-H youth or immediate family member (grandparents, mother, father, brother, sister). Any other living situation must be approved by 4-H Educator.
- **Co-Ownership:** Ownership ID Sheets extends beyond the family with two or more names on the papers to prove co-ownership exists. One of the names on the ID Sheet must be the 4-H youth or an immediate family member.
- **Dog Training Contract**: The 4-H member may enter into an agreement to train someone else's dog in situations that may benefit the member, the dog or both. This arrangement is used for families with the inability to own a dog. **The training contract should not be used as a substitute for normal dog ownership.**
- All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the County 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes. Dog ID forms should reflect the age of the dog.
- Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate.
- All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. County Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the site of the dog show. Once the 4-H dog show is completed, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.
- Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- Bitches in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will run at the end of each class.
- Spayed, monorchid, or neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

# Obedience

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- The first-year class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first year beginner novice class only once.
- An exhibitor who competes in the A groups with their first dog stays in the A groups with that dog for each level. The same is true for the B groups and levels. A member advances from On Leash A to Novice A. Same applies for moving in B classes.
- A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show must show the dog by these guidelines:
  - o Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level
  - o Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back down to the lower level with the same dog.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- All dogs must enter/leave the show ring on a leash.
- Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.
- Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

#### Conformation

- All dogs must enter/leave the ring on a leash.
- Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class, if numbers warrant. First place winners in classes 12-21 will compete for the Best in Show trophy in conformation.
- Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county, if possible), if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- Classes 012-019 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred both animal parents of the same breed.
- Classes 020-021 are for cross-bred dogs-parents of different breeds and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics.

#### AS ABBREVIATED FROM THE WYOMING JUNIOR HORSE SHOW RULE BOOK, MOST CURRENT EDITION.

- Horse Safety Testing paperwork must be on file and complete, including endorsements, at the County Extension Office by the required 4-H deadline advertised by the 4-H program. All classes shall be conducted according to rules contained in the current "Wyoming Junior Horse Show Rule Book." Safety helmets are accepted and encouraged in any class for headgear. The helmet harness must be properly fastened. ASTI-SEI Helmets recommended. One entry is allowed per exhibitor in showmanship. One entry is allowed per exhibitor in each performance class. More than one entry per exhibitor is allowed in each halter class with premiums paid on a maximum of three entries per exhibitor in each class. 4-H horse members must pass the certification process to participate in the county horse show, to be able to show your horse in halter classes youth must pass section 1 and 2A of the certification. To be able to ride in classes, youth must pass section 2B of the certification. Endorsements must be passed in order to participate in the following classes:
  - Trail endorsement for the Trail Class
  - 2. Speed endorsement for all stock and speed classes to include goat tying, working cow and sorting
  - 3. Roping endorsement for all roping classes
- 4-H members must prepare and groom their own animal for all showmanship, halter and performance classes. Exhibitors must be able to control and handle their horse(s) safely.
- Ponies may be measured immediately following the showmanship classes. To qualify as a pony for halter or pony western pleasure, wither height must not
  exceed 58".
- It is strongly recommended that all horses be current on immunizations. Horses will be free from any disease and in good health to be exhibited and shown.
- All stalls must be cleaned and exhibitors must check out with the barn Manager or fair superintendent upon departure. Stalls must be cleaned and vacated within two hours of the conclusion of the horse show. Unclean stalls will be assessed a \$20.00 cleaning fee, per stall. This fee will be withheld from fair premium checks. All horses must leave following the close of the show.
- Arena Management There shall be a ring steward for each judge, and he/she shall be the ONLY person allowed in the ring with the judge in all classes.
   Parents and exhibitors are NOT allowed to address a judge. Questions need to be addressed to the gate attendant. Disqualification may result at the discretion of the officials, the fair superintendents, or the Laramie County 4-H Educator.
- No one horse can be both a 4-H and FFA project. The family horse is defined as one horse that can be shown by multiple members of the direct family (only siblings, no cousins, etc.). However each member must be certified and endorsed to compete on that horse. Also the Horse will not be allowed to run more than once in an event, i.e. the horse can run once with Exhibitor A for Barrels, and once for Exhibitor B in Poles, but cannot run for both events for both exhibitors.
- No 4-H exhibitor will receive aid from any person outside the show ring while showing. Disqualification may result at the discretion of the officials, the fair superintendents, or the Laramie County 4-H Educator.
- Any person having a grievance or complaint shall submit a written signed statement to the 4-H Horse Show Superintendents and 4-H Educator for
  investigation. The statement shall include all facts to clearly explain the case. Grievances must be submitted within 24 hours after completion of the Laramie
  County Horse Show. Foul language, insubordination, cheating or verbal abuse of Fair Officials will not be tolerated. 4-H members who do not exhibit or conduct
  themselves in a sportsman-like manner may be dismissed from the ring and/or forfeit all premiums.
- Contestants must have their numbers pinned securely on their back or BOTH sides of the saddle pad.
- If a contestant foresees a possible conflict in showing two or more halter horses, he must have another 4-H member prepared to show one of the horses. Halter classes will not be delayed for a 4-H member who is showing in one ring when his/her class is called for the other ring.

- If for any reason, an exhibitor cannot use the horse that was pre-entered in a class; they may substitute another 4-H horse they have certified with permission from a Fair Superintendent. However, substitute horses must be certified as a project horse to that exhibitor in all applicable disciplines.
- There will be a final 5-minute call before each class. A five (5) minute tack change will be allowed between classes if necessary. However, the ring steward or gate person MUST BE NOTIFIED of necessary changes. 4-H members will be denied entry if not present for last call into the ring.
- If a horse kicks (or is known to kick), a red ribbon must be tied to its tail. This is a safety measure, and the horse shall not be discriminated against in the halter or performance classes. In addition, if any horse is deemed too dangerous for the rider or others around the rider and horse, superintendents along with the 4-H educator, and/or show judge, has the right to dismiss the horse for the remainder of the day or the remainder of the horse show.
- An approved safety helmet may be worn in all riding classes in lieu of a Western hat and is required in all English classes.
- Only exhibitors and their project horses are allowed on the grounds during the horse show. No one other than the exhibitor shall ride the project horse anywhere on the grounds. No exceptions will be allowed without permission of the Superintendent.
- Halter horse points do not count toward ANY high point awards. Showmanship is not a divisional class but may be taken into consideration toward the overall awards.
- Tiebreakers for all events will be most firsts, most seconds, etc.

Exhibitors of all halter horses must be able to safely handle and control their own horse(s) or they will be excused from their class. Breeds: Horses may be grade; breed registration is not required. Grade & mixed breed horses show in breed they most represent. Registered horses show in breed classes in which they are registered. Other breed class is for any other horse not listed above. Mixed breed horses go in breed classes they most represent. A horse may be registered in more than one breed association; but is allowed to show in only one breed class. No stallions will be accepted for entry. Weanlings may be shown. If born after May 1st, they must be born to a mare Certified to that 4-H member. Weanlings may be shown at mare's side. Weanlings may only be handled and shown by a member age 13 or older, before January of current year. If owner is under age 13, another club member may show that exhibitor's weanling, provided the substitute showman is of correct age.

#### Horse - Performance

Junior horses are those that are 5 years and younger as of January 1st of the current year. Senior horses are those 6 years and older. Premiums are paid on first through sixth place only. The top individual (or next eligible exhibitor) will be Laramie County's representative at State Fair in our allocation of 1 entry per class per county. The only exception is for halter and showmanship\_classes, an exhibitor must have competed with the horse at county fair to compete in state fair, but placing at county fair does not affect state fair eligibility. A horse may be entered in only one class under each event, i.e.: one reining class, one western pleasure class, etc. Refer to current State 4-H /FFA/JUNIOR Horse Show Rules Book for all appointments, tack, class conduct, way of going, etc.

#### PROGRAMMED RIDE

Riders will be scheduled. All riders must check in at gate 5 minutes prior to the start of the class, failure to check in will result in class forfeit. Scheduled times that conflict with other activities must be discussed and arrangements made during the Horse Show check in prior to the start of the show. The class <u>must</u> be ridden English. Readers--Each rider is invited to bring their own readers. Readers can be provided by the show committee upon request. IF YOUR READER IS UNAVAILABLE AT YOUR ASSIGNED TIME, YOU WILL NEED TO PROVIDE ANOTHER READER OR PERFORM WITHOUT A READER.

General adoption of AQHA Rules and USEF Rules: The Current Official Rules and Regulations of the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) and United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) govern this Show and Gymkhana, except as otherwise stated within this document.

Conflicts in Rules: Whenever a conflict exists, LCF Open show rules shall apply.

Gate Call: For all events, there is a 2-minute gate call. After 2 minutes the gate will be closed. If the contestant is having trouble entering the gate, they have an additional 1 minute, and may be offered assistance.

#### Horsemanship regulations and disqualifying infractions:

All eliminations, dismissals, and disqualifications will be at the discretion of a judge and/or show officials, and the decision is final. Contestant will not be entitled to a

refund for any class.

Age of a Horse: The age of the horse will be based on all horses having a January 1 birth date.

**Animal Welfare:** Every horse, at all times, is treated humanely and with dignity, respect, and compassion. The standard by which conduct or treatment will be measured is that which a reasonable person informed and experienced in generally accepted equine training and exhibition procedure or veterinary standards would determine cruel, abusive, or inhumane.

Stallions are prohibited from this event.

#### **Speed Event Safety and Information**

- 1. A safety helmet (ASTM/SEI certified) is highly recommended for use when competing in speed events. However, if a contestant is wearing a Western hat, some method of restraint must be used to ensure the hat does not come off. Hats are optional for all speed events.
- 2. A horse will enter an arena the quickest and safest way whether it is led or ridden; however, after a horse and rider are in the arena, all gates will be closed and the rider will complete the pattern.
- 3. Acceptable western attire must be worn.
- 4. For speed events the using of a hackamore or other type of bridle is an option; however, an event official, or a judge may prohibit the use of bits or equipment he or she may consider severe or inhumane. Contestants have the option of using a tie-down.
- 5. The judge or show official will be allowed to eliminate an entry or call a no time if either the rider or horse:
  - a. Fails to begin the pattern within two minutes after arena entry and gate closure.
  - b. Falls while riding the pattern.
  - c. Displays any kind of cruelty whether or not it is specifically mentioned in the rules.
  - d. Crosses the finish line before completing the prescribed pattern.

- Pocket Pets are considered to be any small rodent, bird, amphibian, reptile or any other special creature that an exhibitor has a pet or has as a special 4H project. Cats, dogs, poultry, and rabbits are not eligible. No venomous pets.
- All Pocket Pets are to be brought in the day of the show and taken home upon completion of the competition.
- Pets must be confined to a portable Escape Proof Cage suitable for that particular species, while they are on the Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must provide their own cages. It is the total responsibility of the exhibitor to provide for the health and welfare of the animal while it is at the fair. Where appropriate, harnesses are required.
- Exhibitors will be asked to discuss and have knowledge of their pet and may be asked to handle their pet at the judge's discretion.
- Any pet showing signs of illness will be removed from the grounds immediately at the discretion of the Show Superintendent.
- Exhibitors will be required to be with their animals at ALL TIMES.
- Animals must be owned by the Exhibitor by July 1.
- Classes will be broken accordingly at a natural basis by the Show Superintendent.
- Presentations may be up to 5 minutes long, but not to exceed that time limit. Handling skills and habitat and information may be demonstrated.

Cage and carry birds will be inspected the morning of the show.

State Veterinarian may ask for permission to take a mouth swab from random birds to test for Avian Influenza.

Check out will following the conclusion of awards.

Champion and Reserve must stay until Thursday @ noon. All others are optional to stay until then as well.

Anyone who needs help figuring out which classes to enter should call the superintendent(s) prior to the entry deadline at the call-in number above. If you need help with your project or preparing for fair please contact the superintendent(s) at least two weeks before fair at the call-in number above.

There will be no classes added or substitutions done after the call in.

#### **Poultry Rules**

- Only three entries per class will be allowed.
- Exhibitors will provide suitable equipment for birds to stay in the building during the show. All exhibitors need to call in or email their final poultry classes during the scheduled time (see above). Poultry not checked in during scheduled times will not be exhibited.
- All birds must pass the health inspection before they enter the building or are put in show cages.
- The health inspector for the poultry show has final say if a bird will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Birds with bare backs, unable to move normally, external parasites, or appear unthrifty will not be allowed on fairgrounds.
- Birds should be in adult plumage. Final determination will be made by the Superintendent.
- No poultry will be on the grounds that is not entered in a class
- All poultry except market animals must be part of the regular project prior to June 1.
- Showmanship birds must be entered in a Youth Show or Market Class.
- All birds must be able to be handled by the judge. Birds not able to be handled will not receive a placing.
- Poultry will be taken care of by the exhibitor. Parents will be able to help only with initial set up and removal. Feed and water must be available at all times. Animals not taken care of in an appropriate manner will be excused from the grounds and all prize money will be forfeited.
- Pheasants, quail, and some other ornamental birds require permits from Wyoming Game and Fish to own. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be aware of and obtain all necessary permits from the proper regulatory agencies.

- Alley ways and pens must be wet down twice daily by exhibitors. The superintendents or 4-H educator will monitor dust level in the barn and may request that any exhibitor wet down large areas in the barn to lessen the dust.

#### Speckled Face Lamb-

Wool Breed Crossbred-These are generally a cross between a wool breed and a Blackface (meat) breed. Lambs should show significant evidence of their wool breed ancestry. Skin will appear pink, white wool, brown/black spots in conjunction with wool on legs below the knees/hocks, significant brown/black spots on face plate. Being wool crossbreds may also be smut faced (light dirty brown mottling on face and legs).

## Black Face Crossbreds-

These are generally a cross between a blackface meat breed and a whiteface meat breed. Lambs will be black pointed, like a blackface breed; legs, ears, head, and belly will primarily be black. Will have significant white spotting on face plate, ears and below the knees/hocks.

- It is highly recommended that a Skill Summary Statement be attached to each entry. This can include a brief explanation of your project to help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others. Due to the absence of interview judging at State Fair it is highly recommended that this information be attached to all State Fair qualifying items. Food & Nutrition and Food Preservation projects have required information that must be attached to each entry. Details can be found in that project section. Contact the Extension Office for examples of skill summary cards.
- Posters, pictures, artwork and photography exhibits should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboard following the WY 4-H Photography & Visual Arts Display Guidelines Brochure. If the items cannot be hung, they will be displayed on the floor or table as space allows. Items not displayed according to these standards may not be eligible for the Wyoming State Fair.
- Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table.
- Any exhibit that puts the safety of others at risk of injury or harm, as deemed by the 4-H Office, may not be allowed to be publicly displayed and/or judged.
- Oversized exhibits will be displayed as space permits.
- Static exhibits are judged by an interview judging process with an emphasis being placed on the learning process of the project area. Exhibits that are judged without the interview judging process are placed at the judge's discretion.
- Rules It is the responsibility of the exhibitor/family to know and understand all rules and regulations. Unless specified, exhibits must conform to the same rules and regulations that apply to other departments at County Fair.
- Entries must be exhibited at County Fair to be eligible for the Wyoming State Fair. It is the Responsibility of the 4-H member/family and to enter exhibits/entries in the correct classes. Incorrect entries can be disqualified. Contact the 4-H Office if you have questions about classes.
- The Laramie County Fair or County extension staff will not be responsible for the loss of or damage to, any exhibit or animal.
- 4-H static exhibits are judged using the Danish system of placing (purple, blue, red, white). Entries winning a blue or purple will be eligible for Wyoming State Fair.
- In June, 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service involving 4-H and FFA youth was reviewed and amended to read as follows: "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For Example: 4-H and FFA members may carry the same type of supervise occupational experience program in vocational agriculture per as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from the supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project."
- A project done in school should be eligible for display or show through one, but only one organization.
- Members are allowed 8 entries in each class with no like items. Like items will be disqualified. Multiple entries can be entered in each class as long as the projects are distinctly different, however you must enter these classes multiple times on your fair entry form. Example: A Jr. aged division member is bringing cucumbers, beans, and tomatoes, in order to be entered for all three vegetables, this member must have three entries on their fair entry form for H-29-1. If you have questions please call the fair office, or the 4-H office.
- Interview judging may occur on three items per youth per project area. Additional items in that area will be set aside and judged later. For example, if an exhibitor has six photos, three photos (from any combination of classes) will be interview judged and the remaining will be set aside and judged later.
- All static exhibits going to State Fair will be transported by extension office unless prior arrangements are made with the 4-H Staff. If a member's item is fragile or breakable it is that member's responsibility to pack this item to go to State Fair on Saturday August 8th at 3:00 PM. Multiple similar exhibits from the same exhibitor or exceptionally heavy or large items will be transported at the discretion of the Extension Office Staff. The Wyoming State Fair, State 4-H Office, and the County Extension Staff will not be responsible for the loss of or damage to, any article or animal. Photography and Visual Arts participants will be limited to taking 4 items of each project to Wyoming State Fair. After interview judging the participant will pick which entries they want to enter at Wyoming State Fair. Entries not chosen must be picked up Saturday.
- Multiple entries can be entered in each class as long as the projects are distinctly different, however you must enter these classes multiple times on your fair entry form. Example: A Jr. aged division member is bringing cucumbers, beans, and tomatoes, in order to be entered for all three vegetables, this member must have three entries on their fair entry form for H-29-1. If you have questions please call the fair office, or the 4-H office.
- All static exhibits (all projects) will be judged on Saturday August 3<sup>rd</sup> from 9-1, unless otherwise stated in that section. Fabric and Fashion, Foods, and Food
  Preservation are all being judged on Friday August 2<sup>nd</sup> at East High School from 9am-Noon. Please see those sections and the 4-H July/Aug 4-H Newsletter for
  more information.

- Static Exhibits not going to State Fair may be removed beginning at 3:00am Saturday August 8th. Items left after 5 p.m. will be disposed of.
- Perishable entries for State Fair need to be taken to the Laramie County Extension Office August 10th, 2020 between 7:30-9:30 A.M. to be transported to Douglas.

- It is highly recommended that a Skill Summary Statement be attached to each entry. This can include a brief explanation of your project to help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others. Due to the absence of interview judging at State Fair it is highly recommended that this information be attached to all State Fair qualifying items.
- Only enter foods that can be safely stored at room temperature. Foods determined to be unsafe at room temperature will be disqualified with the decision of the judge being final. (For example, do not enter cream pies, casseroles, or items with cream cheese frosting, etc.).
- Judges will negatively evaluate entries using commercial cake or bread mixes or those with wrappers (cupcakes, muffins, etc.)

- Judges may or may not choose to open, taste, cut, handle, etc., any entry.
- When whole items are exhibited (cakes, loaves, pies, etc.), enter one-fourth of the item. ALL BREADS: Take an end-cut of the loaf, cut top crust to bottom crust.
- Exhibit food on 6 inch or smaller plastic coated or Styrofoam plate enclosed in a Ziploc bag when possible. Please attach entry tags to the outside of bags to

- ALL FLOWERS EXHIBITED MUST HAVE BEEN GROWN IN WYOMING BY THE EXHIBITORS No silk or plastic flowers. The superintendents in charge of this department shall have the right to remove, at any time, from display, exhibits or parts of exhibits that have become unsightly. However, exhibitors are welcome, and encouraged, to replace any wilted or damaged flowers after the first day. These changes will aid in keeping the entire floriculture department more attractive for the entire duration. Flowers should be well preserved in transit. For longer lasting display, flowers should be cut early in the morning, or after sundown the previous day, with the longest stems possible, including the foliage. Place in cool area, in tepid water, for a minimum of 4 hours (preferably overnight), to completely harden. A sharp knife is best for cutting, making a diagonal cut on the stem (to allow as many plant cells as possible to be exposed) thus permitting the flowers to absorb a great deal of water.
- ENTRY TAGS MUST BE SECURELY ATTACHED TO EACH EXHIBIT BY THE EXHIBITOR BEFORE EXHIBITS ARE ENTERED. USE STRING ONLY TO ATTACH TAGS TO BOTTLES JARS AND VASES. RUBBER BANDS NOT ALLOWED.
- Exhibitors must furnish containers in proportion to size of bloom. Containers are to be clear glass or plastic bottles and jars, or clear glass or plastic inexpensive
  vases (free of labels), (No artificial material of any kind is allowed including plastic, Styrofoam, artificial flowers, or foliage). ENTRIES MUST BE THE SOLE CREATION
  OF THE EXHIBITOR. After flowers are conditioned, NO foliage should be in water.
- Artistic Arrangements ONLY FRESH OR DRIED, DYED OR TREATED NATURAL PLANT MATERIAL MAY BE USED IN ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS. NO ARTIFICIAL
  MATERIAL WILL BE ALLOWED WITHIN ARRANGEMENTS. Foliage, accessories, and bases may be used as desired. The arranger need not have grown flowers used
  in arrangements; however, arrangements must be the sole creation of the exhibitor. The committee will exercise all care, but will not be responsible for loss or
  breakage of containers or accessories

All fruits and vegetables must be clean. The following information will aid in preparing vegetables for exhibit:

- Asparagus It should be fresh, tender and firm, with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost their entire length and taper uniformly. Each should be the same size in diameter at the butt and in length.
- Beans, Snap Green and wax beans should be clean, firm, crisp and free of blemishes. Long straight pods of the same length and color should be selected. The ends of the pods should not be broken and the seed should be about half grown.
- Beans, Lima -Lima bean pods should be well-filled, clean, fresh and a dark green color. They should be uniform in color, shape and size.
- **Beets, Table** Diameter should be 2 to 2 1/2 inches. Side rootlets should be removed, but tap root should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Tops trimmed, leaving 1 inch of leaf stalk above crown.
- **Broccoli** Heads should be uniform in dark green color; condition and size should be compact, not less than 3 inches in diameter, and free from damage by disease, insects, worms, or wilting. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leaves to give an overall length of 5 inches.
- Brussel Sprouts -All the heads should be firm, compact, fresh, a good green color, and uniform in shape and size. Heads not less than 1 inch in diameter are desirable. Stems should be smoothly trimmed to 1/2 inch.
- Cabbage Heads should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape and size, and should be firm, heavy in comparison to size, free from damage by freezing, disease or insect. Midribs should not be large, and the leaves should not be trimmed too closely. Leave stem 1/4 inch long to hold leaves firmly.
- Carrots Select carrots should be smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color and free from greening at the top. Specimens should be typical of their variety avoiding over-size, and should be free from side roots, cracks, or other damage. Cut off tops to 1 inch. Do not trim tap roots.
- Cauliflower White cauliflower should be white and other colors to include but not limited to green, purple, yellow and orange. Cauliflower should be solid, uniform and close flowered and should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the green outside leaves to 1 inch above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain.
- Celery Stalks should be uniform in color and size. Trim outside stalks until color is uniform. The heart, which is made up of stocky inner branches, should be well developed. The outer leaves should be crisp, free from prominent ribs, splits and damage by disease and insects. Wash the plant until it is clean. Trim the root to a triangle-shape not over 1 inch long.
- Corn, Sweet Ears should be well-formed and filled out to tip, free from any kind of injury. Kernels should be soft, tender and filled with thick, opaque, milky juice. Ears should be uniform in size and should be husked and trimmed for judging, free of silks. The shank should be trimmed to 1/4 inch from the base of the cob. The tip of the ear may be neatly clipped, although only a small portion (no more than 1/2 inch) of the cob should be removed.
- Cucumber, Pickling Specimens should be of the same size, not oversized and not more than 1 1/4 inches in diameter or 4 inches long and should be fairly straight with blunt ends. Clean by brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing the spines. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.

- **Cucumber, Slicing** Specimens should be straight, firm, uniform in color shape and size variety; not overgrown, but should be uniformly medium or dark green, 6-9 inches long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut the stem off to 1/4 inch.
- Eggplant Specimens should be smooth, firm, heavy but not too large, uniform in shape and size, for variety grown, free from blemishes, select for uniform coloring, free from bronzing and greening. Wipe with soft cloth. Trim stems to 1 inch.
- Gherkin, West Indian -Separate from cucumbers, as the gherkin and cucumbers are different species. Avoid oversize, not more than 1 1/2 inches in diameter and not more than 3 inches long. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.
- Kohlrabi Specimens should not be hard, woody or pithy. They should be 3 to 4 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumb nail. Clean but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to 1 inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.
- Lettuce, Head/Leaf- Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size and should be crisp, firm, clean, and free from damage. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves. Cut off the stem 1/4 inch from the bottom leaf.
- Muskmelon (Cantaloupe) Specimens should be the same variety, free from decay, cracks and any damage caused by insects, disease, hail or other means. They should be fully ripe, picked on full slip. If several days elapse between picking date and exhibit, they may be picked on half-slip and be permitted to ripen with stems attached
- Onions Should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes, but should not be less than 2 inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their papery skin intact. Do not peel so as to give a slick appearance. The tops (neck) should be small and trimmed to 1 inch. Green onions should be tender, medium sized stems with long, white shanks. Shanks should be smooth and uniform in size. Cut roots to 1/2 in. long. Do not peel heavily.
- Parsnips -Specimens should have firm roots and be smooth, tapering evenly; they should be small in diameter (1 1/2 to 2 1/4), without side roots and should be a light creamy color, with top root left on. Trim top to 1 inch.
- Peas Pods should be fresh, bright green and well-filled with tender peas. They should be uniform in color, shape and size, with green calyxes attached, free from any kind of injury, such as insects, disease or hail damage.
- Potatoes- should be clean (not scrubbed) and free of soil, uniformity of color, shape and size. Free from insect or disease damage, no greening or growth cracks.
- Peppers Specimens should be the same variety, must be the same color and should be uniform in shape and size. Sweet green peppers should be healthy with no reddish blush or other discoloration. Sweet red or yellow peppers should have healthy, clear red or yellow color, with no greenish tinges. All peppers should be free from sun scald or damages caused by insects and diseases. Leave stem on and trim to 1 inch.
- Pumpkin, Pie Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size, free from insects and mechanical injury. Do not wash, may be brushed clean. Leave stem attached and trim to 1 inch.
- Radishes They should be uniform in color, shape and size. Flesh should be crisp and tender, not pithy, and be free from injury caused by disease, insects, growth cracks or mechanical damage. Trim leaf tops to 1 inch.
- Rhubarb Stacks should be uniform in color, shape, size and texture. Length after trimming should be at least 10 inches. Stalks should be tender, crisp, fresh, not pithy, limp or wilted. Neatly trim the tops, leaving 1 inch of leaves and prongs. The stalks should be pulled when harvested, not cut off. The basal husks should be removed from the bottom of the stalk.
- Spinach Specimens may be harvested as entire plant with leaves left attached to the pinkish root crown. Leaves should be dark green from either the smooth or crumpled variety.
- Squash, Summer Pick when small (best eating 4 to 7 inches, depending on variety). The shell should be extremely soft, fairly tender and have undeveloped seeds. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size, free from damage or blemishes. Brush to clean off dirt, wash. Trim stem to 1 inch.
- Squash, Winter Pick when mature, when shells are hardened. Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size, free from insect injury or mechanical damage. Brush to clean, but do not wash, Trim stem to 1 inch.
- Swiss Chard Specimens must be fresh, crisp, with bright green leaves and blemish free stems. They should be uniform in color and size. Clean by washing if necessary. Trim off roots and trim butt to a triangular shape.
- **Tomatoes** Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, and free from cracks, sun scald and blemishes, ripe, solid and without stems. Specimens should be true to type and variety. (Leave stems on the pickling or preserving types).
- **Turnips** Specimens should be uniform in size, shape and color, medium-sized, 1 1/4 to 2 3/4 inches in diameter. Flesh should be crisp, fine grained and not pithy. They should be free of damage, clean and bright in color. They should be firm, with secondary rootlets removes, with 2 to 3 inches of tap root remaining. Trim tops to 1 inch.

- Photos may be taken with any camera including a digital camera and then entered in any of the categories: black and white, color, sepia or highly digitalized photographs captured on film. (See Highly Digitalized section for more information, Division # 91)
- Photographs may be framed with or without glass as long as the hangers are made of wire or metal. The Fair is not responsible for damage to frames or glass.
- For unframed photographs, each photo must be mounted on 1/8" to ¼" thick foam board with photo hangers securely attached.
- All photographs must be at least 5"x7" and no larger than 20"x24", exceptions are "collections", which may be smaller.
- Judging criteria are: focus/sharpness; exposure/lighting; composition; emotional impact; story telling; subject/focal point; mounting/framing; color balance; creativity & originality; print quality
- You are responsible to enter your photo into the correct category.
- Each exhibitor may enter in as many classes as desired, BUT ONLY ONE PHOTO PER EACH CLASS, exception is digital Photography/Division # 91
- Adults entering must enter as EITHER professional or amateur, not both.
- Only grades K-12 may enter in both, K-12 and amateur.

A-Amateur

- PROFESSIONAL refers to those whose work is/has been produced for the purpose of sale. - Photographs on exhibit may be sold by the artist but must remain in place until the Fair officially closes at 10 am of the final Saturday of Fair. Items for sale must be tagged with a separate piece of paper stating the sale price and the name and phone number of the seller. The sale of the photograph is not handled by the Laramie County Fair, nor do the proceeds go to the Fair.
- Photos and ribbons must remain in place during Fair. Photographs must be picked up during the last Saturday of Fair starting 10am to 3pm. Any photograph not picked up by then or otherwise arranged with the superintendent will become property of the Laramie County Fair. You will need your computer entry tag stub to identify your entry and obtain your photographs and ribbons.
- Photos not meeting stated rules may be disqualified by judges or superintendents.
- The judge or superintendents reserve the right to re-categorize or disqualify any entry.
- All Works must be the sole property of the Photographer. **No Copyrighting will be allowed**. If an outside medium is utilized or reproduced in any way by Photographer, written permission is required by originator.

Conflicts in Rules: Whenever a conflict exists, LCF Open show rules shall apply.

Gate Call: For all events, there is a 2-minute gate call. After 2 minutes the gate will be closed. If the contestant is having trouble entering the gate, they have an additional 1 minute, and may be offered assistance.

#### Horsemanship regulations and disqualifying infractions:

All eliminations, dismissals, and disqualifications will be at the discretion of a judge and/or show officials, and the decision is final. Contestant will not be entitled to a refund for any class.

Age of a Horse: The age of the horse will be based on all horses having a January 1 birth date.

- 7. A horse will enter an arena the quickest and safest way whether it is led or ridden; however, after a horse and rider are in the arena, all gates will be closed and the rider will complete the pattern.
- 8. Acceptable western attire must be worn.
- 9. For speed events the using of a hackamore or other type of bridle is an option; however, an event official, or a judge may prohibit the use of bits or equipment he or she may consider severe or inhumane. Contestants have the option of using a tie-down.
- 10. The judge or show official will be allowed to eliminate an entry or call a no time if either the rider or horse:
  - e. Fails to begin the pattern within two minutes after arena entry and gate closure.
