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
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Charlotte Ehlman

Entry Deadline Change: Midnight July 15th, 2024

Entry Tag Pick-Up Dates: Static entries (non-livestock) can be picked up July 22nd, 23rd, 25th, and 26th from 8:00am-4:00pm at the Fair Office at 3801 Archer Parkway, Cheyenne, WY 82009. NO PICK UP ON JULY 24th. Only entry corrections will be done July 22nd through the 26th. No additional entries will be accepted. If you are unable to pick up your tags during this time, entry tags will be available for pick up at the Exhibit Hall starting on Thursday August 1st.

WELCOME:

The Laramie County Fair Staff welcomes you to the 2024 Laramie County Fair- "Raising the Steaks!" We encourage you to participate in this year's events.

PLEASE NOTE: ALL NEW RULES AND INFORMATION ARE NOTED IN RED. PLEASE READ CAREFULLY. ALL ENTRANTS, EXHIBITORS, AND PARTICIPANTS IN THE LARAMIE COUNTY FAIR ARE REQUIRED TO AND WARRANT THAT THEY READ, UNDERSTOOD, AND ARE BOUND BY THE FOLLOWING FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS.

LARAMIE COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. Laramie County Fair Rules and Regulations

A. General

- 1. The Laramie County Fair reserves the final and absolute right to interpret general rules and regulations and settle and determine matters and differences that may arise in accordance with the procedures set forth in these Rules and Regulations.
- 2. The Laramie County Fair is a member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) who supports the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to read, understand, and comply with the IAFE National Code of Ethics. A full description of the IAFE National Code of Ethics is located at www.fairsandexpos.com.
- 3. All shows are open for public viewing.
- 4. Special rules are published in each department and division where necessary. The Laramie County Fair is a Fair that involves the union of two different National Organizations; 4H and FFA, and as such, must have a separation between those Organizations' shows and rules. Laramie County Fair also incorporates Youth Shows with the need for an additional set of rules to govern those shows individually. Within this Fairbook, you will find three sets of Rules and Regulations setting forth these Organizations' individual guidelines that need to be followed depending on what show you may be involved in at the time. Please be cognizant of what Organizations' show you are participating in and what Rules, Regulations, procedures, and enforcements you may need to follow. Please be aware that the Laramie County Fair cannot and will not enforce any rules or regulations involved with 4H or FFA shows.

Refer to individual Departments and Divisions for special rules and regulations.

5. By making entry to the Laramie County Fair each exhibitor, exhibitor's parent(s) and/or legal guardian acknowledge that he/she has read, understands, accepts, and will abide by the liability requirements and all policies, the National Code of Show Ring Ethics, and rules and regulations of the Laramie County Fair.

B. Liability Statements

- 1. All exhibitors and exhibits must comply with the policies and regulations of the Laramie County Fair. The Laramie County Fair, its employees, agents, elected and appointed officials will in no case be liable or responsible for any loss or damage that may occur to or with any exhibit. Each exhibitor shall indemnify the Laramie County Fair, its employees, agents, elected and appointed officials against all legal or other proceedings in regards thereto, as well as damage, injury or loss to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor, or any other person or property, or any of the animals exhibited by him/her, or arising out of, or in any way connected with, such exhibition of any of the animals so exhibited.
- 2. I hereby acknowledge that engaging in activities in connection and association with the programs, events and activities of the Laramie County Fair carries an inherent risk of injury, property damage and financial loss, including, but not limited to, physical, financial risks and risks to property. I also acknowledge and understand that the Laramie County Fair makes no representations, guarantees, assurances or warranties for safety, function or my continued participation, in regard to its actions, plans, work, activities, events, equipment or supplies. In full acknowledgment of the inherent risks my request to participate is hereby consented.

Further I do hereby, for myself, my heirs, personal representatives and assigns release and discharge the Laramie County Fair, Laramie County and/or any of their elected officials, employees, agents, volunteers and their successors and assigns from all actions, causes of action, damages, claims or demands both direct and consequential, for all known or unknown personal injuries, property damage or financial loss resulting from or arising out of, or in connection with, my request to participate in events, activities, programs or other actions in association with or at the direction of the Laramie County Fair.

I certify and warrant that I have read and fully understand the foregoing Release. Further, I am REQUESTING TO PARTICIPATE AND RELEASING OF LIABILITY,

freely, voluntarily and without coercion and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in activities of the Laramie County Fair and other good and valuable consideration. I further certify that I am 18 years of age or older. If I am a minor, my parent or guardian, fully participates in and acknowledges the contents and effect of this waiver and release on my behalf.

3. All fair participants including but not limited to exhibitors, spectators, vendors, entertainers, superintendents, etc. causing property damage will be responsible to the injured party either by paying for any and all damages directly to the injured party or by paying a subrogation claim made by the injured party's insurance company.

C. Complaints

- 1. All complaints must be brought to the attention of a 4-H Educator, FFA Advisor, Show Superintendent, or the Fair Manager before the end of the show regarding the complaint in question. The complainant must provide sufficient time to be reviewed and without interruption of the show(s) or the complaint will not be considered.
- 2. No complaints will be accepted or reviewed after the completion of the show in question.
- 3. All complaints will be reviewed by no less than (3) representatives made up of individuals from each organization (4-H, FFA, & Fair).
 - The 4-H Educators will make the final determination regarding complaints associated with all 4-H Division Shows,
 - The FFA Advisors will make the final determination regarding complaints associated with all FFA Division Shows and
 - The Fair Manager will make the final determination regarding complaints associated with all youth, open class, and contest Division Shows

- 4. All determinations are final and may not be protested
- 5. Judges may exercise their discretion in the application and implementation of applicable rules and guidelines. Judges' decisions may not be protested.

D. Arrival/Departure of Entries

- 1. All exhibits must be in place for inspection by the public and/or judges in accordance with the Fair schedule published within this book.
- 2. All livestock exhibits, except for sale animals, will be allowed to leave after the corresponding specie show and/or Born and Raised.
- 3. If you choose to take your animals home after their show, you must clean out your pen(s).
- 4. Removing an exhibit, including animals, prior to release time without the permission of the Fair Staff will result in forfeiture of all premiums and may preclude future exhibiting privileges.
- 5. Exhibit Hall exhibits will be released the last Saturday at between 8:00 am and 12:00 pm.
- 6. The Fair Staff or Superintendents will not be responsible for items left or not picked up at the designated times.
- 7. We will be requiring a \$50 deposit per stall for use of the horse stall building during Fair. If your pen is left clean, you will receive your deposit back. If your stall is left dirty, your deposit will be kept. Deposit may be paid by only cash or check.

E. Entries

- 1. Each FFA, 4-H, Open Class, Fair Fun static (non-animal) and animal exhibit in the Fair must have an entry listing on the correct official paper entry form or online.
- 2. All exhibitors, 4-H Clubs, and FFA Chapters must have a completed exhibitor profile in ShoWorks entered by the exhibitor online or by submitting a paper entry form by the entry deadline in order to enter a class, show, or contest and to receive premiums and awards.
- 3. Official Fair entry forms and the online entry link are available at www.laramiecountyfair.com. Paper entry forms may be scanned and emailed to fairoffice@laramiecountyfair.com, faxed to 775-7353, mailed to 3801 Archer Parkway, Cheyenne, WY 82009, or dropped off.
- 4. No late entries will be accepted past the July 15th deadline. Only entries considered hardship will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis after July 15th.
- 5. All open class static entries are limited to Laramie County Residents. All 4-H and FFA entries are limited to Laramie County 4-H members and Laramie County FFA Chapter members.
- 6. Open Class Superintendents have the right to change entries to correct Age division if they see fit.
- 7. Exhibits must be the handiwork of the exhibitor and must not have been previously shown at the Laramie County Fair.
- 8. Only entry corrections will be done during the designated entry tag pickup dates and times and no additional entries will be accepted.
- 9. No additional classes or entries will be added the day of the show; including showmanship.

F. Premiums and Awards

- 1. No prize will be awarded or sponsored by any individual or group without the permission of the Laramie County Fair.
- 2. Premiums and awards will only be awarded to exhibitors, 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters that have a completed exhibitor profile and official entry in ShoWorks either entered by the exhibitor online or by submitting a paper entry form.
- 3. Judges will not award prizes to any exhibit/animal that does not meet minimum qualifications of the division in which it is entered. It is the intention of the Fair Staff that no premium or distinction of any kind be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. The rule will be adhered to whether or not there is competition. The awarding of a trophy for those classes so designated is at the discretion of the judge of that class. When there are fewer than three exhibits in any class, some classes can be combined and the judge will award whatever placing the exhibits deserve on the basis of quality. When there is no competition between exhibitors in a class, only one award will be given. No exhibit will be eligible for more than one premium in any one class.
- 4. No premium shall be awarded, nor will any premium be paid on any animal or article not mentioned or classified in this premium list.
- 5. Premium Disputes: <u>September 30 of the current exhibiting year</u>, is the deadline for reporting any errors in a premium check or for a check not having been received by the exhibitor. No changes will be made nor checks issued after September 30. Premiums are paid based on placement on official Judging Sheets, not ribbons received.
- 6. Premium checks will be made payable to the exhibitor name designated on the entry form and mailed to the address provided by the exhibitor. Exhibitors are responsible for notifying the Fair Office of any change to the exhibitors mailing address.
- 7. Exhibitors who receive premiums above the reporting limits set by the IRS will be required to complete a W-9 prior to receiving their premium check. A Form 1099-MISC will be mailed to you for your taxes.
- 8. If multiple entries are submitted in departments, divisions and/or classes that only allow one entry, then the highest placement will be paid a premium and all others will be disqualified from a premium payment.
- 9. Premium checks must be redeemed by December 31st of current fair year to avoid forfeiture.
- 10. All exhibitors requesting consideration for adjustment of a premium must submit their request online or by mail on a premium adjustment request form. Mailed premium adjustments must be post marked by September 30th of current year. Neither adjustment requests nor reissue of unreceived checks will be considered after September 30th of current year. Requests made by phone will not be accepted.

G. Animal and Livestock Policy- These policies encompass 4-H, FFA, and Fair as a whole

- 1. All livestock, unless otherwise stated under the specific department, are required to pass a Veterinarian inspection before unloading animals on grounds.
- 2. Any animal deemed ineligible to show may not remain on the fairgrounds.
- 3. All Veterinarian decisions are final and may not be protested.
- 4. If the Veterinarian is unable to make a determination on animal eligibility, Events Director, or designee, reserves the right to declare an at-risk animal ineligible out of precaution for the health and safety of the exhibitors and other livestock.
- 5. All market animals will enter in the appropriate Market Animal Division. 4-H and FFA designations, breeds, and weights will be determined at the weigh-in. Each market animal exhibiting/showing must have an entry in ShoWorks and the correct ear tag numbers listed. Proof of ownership may be required.
- 6. All Market animals exhibiting in the Laramie County Fair will be tagged at the centralized tagging events with a Laramie County Fair approved RFID tag. In addition to the approved RFID tag, we will require an additional form of identification for each animal exhibiting. If there is no additional form of identification in/on the animal's ear on the day of tagging, we will provide the animal with an additional tag.
- 7. All livestock will be checked in by the barn superintendent and assigned stalls. No animal will be stalled without first checking with the barn superintendent. Closing time for check-in and weigh-in for all livestock areas will be in accordance with the Fair schedule.
- 8. All animals must be declared 4-H or FFA before stepping on the scale.
- 9. Once an animal and/or exhibitor leaves the weigh-in area, no changes will be made to their weight, breed classification, market/breeding designation, or 4-H/FFA status.
- 10. No livestock will be re-weighed.
- 11. 4-H and FFA exhibitors are responsible for complying with all State Brand Laws and all Wyoming animal health laws.
- 12. No animal or exhibit may be entered by more than one exhibitor within any given year.

- 13. No animal or exhibit may be shown in both FFA and 4-H within any given year.
- 14. No animal can be shown in both Market and Breeding in the same year.
- 15. All entered animals must be halter broken and manageable by the exhibitor. Any animal that is considered a hazard to exhibitors, spectators, or others will be excused from the show and the grounds.
- 16. Inhumane treatment or abuse of animals will not be tolerated. This includes dragging, beating, kicking, spanking, slapping or anything that causes an audible noise when done to the animals while in or out of the show ring. Exhibitors will receive one warning. Second offense will result in automatic disqualification of exhibitor and all entries for that species with no recourse. This will be a Fair wide rule and will encompass every show.
- 17. The 4-H Grand Champion and Reserve Market Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat will compete against the FFA Grand Champion Market Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat for the combined Overall Grand Champion Title.
- 18. Any animal exhibited in the 4-H or FFA Divisions must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before the date specified in the corresponding 4-H or FFA rules.
- 19. Any act of artificially filling animals internally will not be tolerated. This will include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other esophageal method. Violation of this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums and disqualification of animal and exhibitor without recourse.
- 20. Drench guns are permitted.

Ownership Deadlines:

All livestock must be owned by the individual members in compliance with the following dates:

- a. Market Beef-February 1st
- b. Dog ID Forms- May 1st
- c. Market Sheep, Goats, & Swine-June 1st
- d. Horse Safety Certification Completion- Please see Horse Section, dates posted in the 4-H newsletter and emails.
- 21. All Sheep and Goats must have a USDA/APHIS Scrapie Identification tag in place prior to tagging.
- 22. In the interest of ensuring the maximum possible fire protection rating, the Laramie County Fair will require wood shavings as the primary bedding material for animals exhibited at the Laramie County Fair. Poultry and rabbits without trays at the bottom of the cage must have bedding on the ground under the cage. However, because of special health considerations, ONLY Dairy Goats and Breeding Sheep will be permitted to use the bedding material of their choice. All other animals will be bedded on wood shavings. While the Laramie County Fair does provide some bedding, exhibitors need to provide additional bedding if the bedding that is provided is not sufficient.
- 23. All livestock must be kept in assigned stall areas while on the fairgrounds. Stall cards for all livestock, poultry, and rabbit exhibits must be in place and properly filled out. Replacement cards will be made available for those that have become torn or soiled. Failure to abide by this policy will result in forfeiture of premiums.
- 24. With the exception of designated cattle tie out times of 7:00 pm- 9:00 am, cattle are not allowed to be taken to trailers or other areas away from the cattle barns/chute area at any time.

H. Laramie County Fair Fitting and Grooming Policy

1. Exhibitors must accompany, care for, and exhibit their own livestock. An Exhibitor is expected to take care of and groom/fit their own animal. However, in the interest of safety and education, an Exhibitor may be assisted both at home and at the Laramie County Fair. Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person doing the assisting is educating the youth member as to the technique in fitting and showing.

I. Camping

- 1. Camp Space Reservations will open online beginning June 1st. Spaces are limited and therefore they will be assigned by a drawing. Only online submissions will be accepted and a drawing will be run to determine recipients of the Water/Electric spaces. At a date determined by Fair Staff, spaces will be awarded using random number selection that correlates directly to your entry.
- 2. Camp space fee is \$100.00 for Water/ Electric, \$75.00 for Electric Only, and \$50 for Dry Camping per space per unit for the week of fair.
- 3. The corresponding fee must be paid in full no later than July 1st. If left unpaid, The Laramie County Fair reserves the right to reassign your space.
- 4. There are limited amount of spots available with 50 amps hookups. We make every effort to place you in the space requested, but you will be required to provide any additional adapters needed to make your space useable.
- 5. Campers and RVs are required to stay within designated camp space. Pop outs cannot extend past assigned camp space.
- 6. No mailed or phone reservations will be accepted.
- 7. Campers are responsible for any damages or waste left in camper spaces.
- 8. Unsightly or damaged spaces may result in cancellation of reservation for the following year.
- 9. There will be no spaces available until the day before Fair begins. Please do not arrive before this time.
- 10. No camping will be allowed on the grounds unless proper health and fire regulations are met.
- 11. NO juvenile camps will be permitted. Each campsite must be supervised at all times by an adult (age 21 & over).
- 12. Self-contained units will be allowed to remain in the park providing no waste material is expelled from the unit. Campers who do not have waste facilities will be allowed, provided all trash and debris are disposed of in barrels located around the park, and restrooms facilities are used.
- 13. ABSOLUTELY NO TENTS will be allowed to be set up on the grounds under any circumstances.
- 14. Your assistance in meeting County fire (W.S. 18-5-201 & W.S. 18-5-301) and health codes (W.S. 35-1-303) is requested.

J. Driving-Fire-Health-Safety Rules for Archer Fairgrounds

- 1. Certain fire lanes as posted must be kept open for minimum safety. No hay or grain can be stored in or within 25 feet of any wooden stall or barn. A 25 foot fire lane must be kept open directly in front of all barns and stalls, and trailer and camper units cannot be left in these areas without maintaining proper safe distance from fire lanes. Any electrical hook-up can only be made at properly designated electrically grounded units. The park will be patrolled daily by fire and health authorities. A warning will be issued and time given to correct deficiencies. A second notice will be cause for ejection from the park. No privately-owned heavy equipment will be allowed on the grounds (i.e. tractors, loaders, etc.)
- 2. Any electrical equipment used by an exhibitor at Laramie County Fair must be UL approved and meet National Electrical code.
- 3. For your safety as well as others-BICYCLES AND PETS, INCLUDING DOGS AND CATS, WILL ONLY BE ALLOWED IN DESIGNATED AREAS. NO PETS OR BICYCLES IN LIVESTOCK BARN OR EXHIBIT HALL. Service animals welcome. According to County Ordinance W.S. 11-31-301 or W.S. 11-31-107, If a pet is found to be a public nuisance within the meaning of this article, the owner shall be subject to the penalties as provided for in Article V of this resolution and any other penalty imposed by applicable law, ordinance or regulation. Due to this, we ask that all pets be kept on a leash while on public property.
- 4. Public use of ATV's (All-Terrain Vehicle), RUV's (Recreational Utility Vehicle) and Golf Carts at the Archer Fairgrounds with the exception of Fair Staff Official Use and Emergency Personnel is prohibited.
- 5. Curfew will be 11:00 p.m. on all nights.

6. No alcohol is allowed in the barns and must be contained within 50 feet of the campground.

K. Superintendents

1. Barn and Department Superintendents, as Laramie County Fair representatives, shall have charge of the department assigned to them. The Superintendent will have responsibility of the stalls, pens, or display spaces in their department. Arrangement of pens, stalls, and exhibit space will be under their supervision. It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to inform the judges, in their department, of the policies governing the shows and awards before judging begins. Each Superintendent is responsible with caring for and posting the judging books of their department. They must see that all placings and awards are duly and properly entered and awarded. It is the responsibility of the Superintendent to ensure that upon completion of the show/contest that the original judging book is immediately submitted to the Fair Office.

L. Herdsmanship

The purpose of Herdsmanship is to encourage exhibitors in developing and maintaining clean and presentable stalling areas as well as demonstrating good animal husbandry and welfare. It also promotes pride and enthusiasm for the industry and rewards those exhibitors that achieve this purpose. Herdsmanship duties are the primary responsibility of the livestock exhibitor.

Herdsmanship Awards: 100% in any species=\$25; 95% in any species=\$15; 90% in any species=\$5

There will also be a "Supreme Exhibitor" winner of each species that will receive a banner. This will be given to the exhibitor that goes above and beyond in Herdsmanship.

Judging: Judging will be completed by the Herdsmanship Superintendent along with the assistance of a Herdsmanship committee made up of 2 additional members. The Herdsmanship contest will begin at the time the division of animals is to be in place and ends when animal exhibits are released. Judging for Herdsmanship may take place any time between 7:00 am and 9:00 pm.

Herdsmanship will be judged on the following criteria:

Animals: (15 Points) Clean at all times with proper grooming, feed, bedding, and care apparent, properly penned and secured. Appear healthy and free of disease or insect infestation.

Stalls: (25 Points) Clean and neat, clean bedding, full water bucket, feed and feed pans and buckets clean and in place, no excessive manure in stall area, stall cards/exhibitor signs clearly in place. Project presentation boards, posters, etc. are highly encouraged. This is your opportunity to educate the public about your project!

Tack/Feed Area: (10 Points) Kept clean and neatly arranged, grooming and tie-out areas kept clean, personal items out of sight or neatly stored.

Alleyways: (25 Points) Exhibitors designated alleys and commons areas kept clean, free of equipment, loose dirt and dust kept under control with proper sweeping and/or sprinkling, no manure in piles.

Exhibitors: (25 Points) Proper courtesy and conduct shown by exhibitors at all times and in all places including with the public and other exhibitors. All exhibitors are expected to participate in Herdsmanship.

Any animals not meeting general health or Herdsmanship standards can/will be identified to the species Superintendent. At which point, a decision will be made on whether the animal(s) will be removed from the grounds.

We will be requiring a \$50 deposit per stall for use of the horse stall building during Fair. If your pen is left clean, you will receive your deposit back. If your stall is left dirty, your deposit will be kept. Deposit may be paid by only cash or check.

- 1. All exhibits must be owned by members in good standing from a Laramie County FFA Chapter. All exhibits must be taken possession of and student will provide daily care of his/her project. Proof of ownership may be required. Ownership of lambs and swine must be declared by June first of current year. These exhibits must be worthy of competition. It shall be at the discretion of the judge whether to award premium, a ribbon only, or no award at all. All agronomy entries exhibited for competition must have been grown by a member of his own project or be prepared as a supplement practice under the FFA advisor's supervision.
- 2. Please see Fitting Rules and Weight limits page for that information.
- 3. All animals shown in the FFA section of the Laramie County Fair market classes must be eligible for the Kiwanis Sale of Champions and must have been weighed and tagged prior to being shown.

USDA WHOLESOME MEAT

The Laramie County Fair endorses and supports the USDA Wholesome Meat Act and insists exhibitors comply. Exhibitors of all market animals (beef, sheep, swine, market goats, poultry, and rabbits) must certify their compliance with manufacturer's pre-market withdrawal periods specified for any and all medications, drugs, pesticides or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited. Certification will be requested upon arrival at weigh-in at the County Fair.

All "Wholesome Meat Assurance Act" rules and regulations must be adhered to. The seller will be personally responsible for any animal which may be condemned because of chemical misuse. Any cost to prove or disprove the use of medications, tranquilizers, and/or injectable substances will be borne by the exhibitor. If proven guilty, the exhibitor will be permanently barred from the livestock sale.

KIWANIS LIVESTOCK SALE

The Kiwanis Sale will consist of the following categories: Market Beef, Market Swine, Market Sheep, Market Goats, and Market Poultry. Any member may sell up to 2 animals, but they must represent different categories as outlined above. The sale will consist of 10 market beef, 10 market swine, 10 market sheep, 5 market goats and 5 market birds. In the beef, swine, and sheep categories, the Champion and reserve Champion in each of five weight divisions will be included in the sale.

In the event that there are less than thirty head of a species, classes will be divided accordingly, but sale slots will be selected by using a top overall animal ranking for sale order and qualification. If this occurs, we will select a top ten overall, or until the required number of members have qualified for the sale. This would only apply to beef, swine, and sheep if we have less than thirty head for that species. For goats the top five overall will be selected using the same format regardless of the number of entries. When an animal is selected the next highest placing animal from that class will come out for consideration for the top ten. Example: There are three classes the top two from each class will come out for the overall. The champion is selected from the 2nd class, the third place from that class will come out and be in contention to be selected. If the 2nd place in that class is selected next the 4th place will come out for contention. All animals from one class could qualify for a sale spot when selecting an overall ranking. You may win a class and the judge may not pick any from that class for the overall ranking, so you don't make the sale.

The Champion Market Pen of 3 Broilers/Fryers, Champion Market Turkey, Champion Market Duck, and Champion Market Goose (less than 26 weeks) will be included in the sale.

- 1. For shows with 30 or more head: The first duplication follows the Champion, the second duplication will follow the Reserve champion, and the other duplications will start with the heaviest division and move in order to the lightweight division. However, no fourth place division animals will sell before the third place division animals are sold. If the Champions and Reserve Champions come from that same division, only the first duplication will come from that division. The judge will determine division placing from class winners.
- 2. In situations where a member qualifies more than one animal per category, the following duplication process will be used: In divisions with more than one class, all 1st and 2nd place class winners will come together and be placed within the division. This division placing will then be used to determine duplicates for the sale. Sale Order: First duplication follows the champion; second duplication will follow the reserve champion. Other duplications will start with the heaviest division and move in order to lightweight division, however, no fourth-place animals will sell until all third-place animals are sold. If Champions and Reserve Champions come from the same division, only the first duplication will come from that division.
- 3. FFA Exhibitors will complete Kiwanis sale forms immediately following the selection of the overall champions of each market show.
- 4. Members qualifying more than 1 animal per category are required to sell the highest placing animal. Overall Champions and Overall Reserve Champions will be sold before Division Champions and Division Reserve Champions. Division Champions will be sold before Reserve Division Champions.
- 5. If a member qualifies more than two species, the member is required to sell any Grand Champions overall first, followed by any Reserve Champions overall. If a member qualifies three species and are not Grand or Reserve overall of those species, the member may pick the two animals they wish to sell. If the member qualifies two head in different species, they will sell those two. In the event a member qualifies an animal through the duplication process as their third animal, the qualifying animals will sell over the duplication animals. If a member qualifies with all duplicate animals, they can choose which animals they want to sell. A member may only sell two animals and they must be from different species. All poultry and fowl are considered one species.
- 6. The duplication process for poultry will be goose, turkey, duck, chickens. If the same exhibitor qualifies in more than one category they will be required to sell the category that comes first in this order.

THIS IS A MARKET ANIMAL SHOW. NO TRADING OR SUBSTITUTION OF DIFFERENT ANIMALS AFTER THE SALE WILL BE ALLOWED. ALL ELIGIBLE, HIGHEST PLACING ANIMALS WILL SELL.

4-H ANIMAL PROJECT RULES, & REGULATIONS

- You must turn in your paperwork for State Fair to the Extension Office by August 8th at 12 PM for all animals except horses. Horse entries are due by 12 PM on Aug. 6th.
- 2. All exhibitors selling an animal must turn in the 4-H Sale Consignment card by 5:00 PM Thursday, August 8*, 2024. Buyer thank you notes for these animals are also due at this time. All animals sold must be legally owned by the 4-H member in accordance with species ownership deadlines.
- 3. 4-H members must accompany and personally exhibit their own livestock. In case they need help, they may have other Laramie County 4-H members assist them.
- 4. Please see Fitting Rules and Weight limits page for that information.
- In June, 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service, involving 4-H and FFA youth, was reviewed and amended to read as follows: "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised occupational experience program in Vocational Agriculture or as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project."
- 6. Youth age for all 4-H events is calculated as their "4-H Age" which is their age on Jan. 1 of the current 4-H year. Age groups are broken down as follows:
 - Cloverbud-Age 5-7 on Jan. 1
 - **Junior** Age 8-10 on Jan. 1
 - Intermediate- Age 11-13 on Jan. 1
 - Senior- Age 14-18 on Jan. 1

Cloverbuds are non-competitive and can only participate in certain 4-H events during fair.

- 7. All 4-H competitive events are open to juniors, intermediates, and seniors. If you have questions about which age group to enter contact the Extension Office before the entry deadline.
- 8. 4-H Showmanship.
 - 4-H members competing in 4-H showmanship in one species contest are not precluded from competing in the same species contest in FFA
 - Showmanship exhibitors must compete with their own animals.
 - Preparation and showing of animals must be consistent with the rules in the livestock section.
 - No boars, stallions, bulls, rams or bucks (billies), or other intact males will be allowed in any showmanship event. No lactating animals will be shown except for dairy animals. Cats and Dogs are exempt from this rule but should refer to individual rules in the appropriate species sections below.
 - Judging will be on the basis of exhibitor's ability to present their animal for judging including the movement and positioning of the animal, as well as
 condition and cleanliness of the animal as it relates to being ready for show. Mannerisms, conduct of the showman, and industry knowledge are also
 included.
 - All showmanship classes must be pre-entered.
- 9. For additional 4-H specific rules and guidance please refer to the 4-H Newsletter or the 4-H Update Emails.
- 10. To verify entries at your event please bring a copy of your ShoWorks online entry receipt or a copy of your verified paper entry to all contests and events.

FITTING RULES:

- The following are the fitting rules for all 3 organizations.
- If there are any questions about the following rules, please contact a member of that organization.

Fair Fitting rule- Applies to Born and Raised shows, Breeding shows, and Open shows:

• Exhibitors must accompany, care for, and exhibit their own livestock. An Exhibitor is expected to take care of and groom/fit their own animal. However, in the interest of safety and education, an Exhibitor may be assisted both at home and at the Laramie County Fair. Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person doing the assisting is educating the youth member as to the technique in fitting and showing.

4-H Fitting rule- Any show that is labeled as a 4-H show (ex. 4-H Market Goat show):

• 4-H members are expected to perform the majority of the care and grooming of their animals at Fair. In the interest of safety and education, a member may be assisted by any Laramie County 4-H/FFA member, family member, Educator/FFA Advisor, or Laramie County 4-H screened Volunteer Leader. Family members are defined as: mother, father, grandparents, siblings, aunts, uncles, and any step thereof or any person who stands in as legal guardian. Please remember that Fair is an educational experience and youth should be involved in the process.

All violations or protests must be reported to a 4-H Educator or specie superintendent before an animal enters the ring.

In the event of violation of the above, consequences will include:

- 1) Violator may be asked to leave the show
- 2) Dismissal of Exhibitor from the show.

FFA Fitting rule- Any show that is labeled as a FFA show (ex. FFA Market Goat show):

• FFA members are expected to take care of, groom and fit their own animal(s) at Fair. In the interest of safety and education, a member may be assisted by other Laramie County 4-H/FFA members/advisors, as well as immediate family. Immediate family is defined as parents, grandparents, sister/brother - only. Please remember that Fair is an educational experience. The exhibitor is expected to perform the majority of fitting procedures on their own.

FFA advisors will monitor fitting and preparation prior to the start of each show and will deal with any violations at the time. Any protests must be reported to an Ag teacher before the animal enters the ring.

In the event of violation of the above, consequences will include:

- Violator may be asked to leave the show.
- 2) Dismissal of Exhibitor from the show.

4-H LIVESTOCK SALE

Chairman: Lance West

General Information:

Each market beef, sheep, goat, poultry, rabbit, and swine exhibitor may sell one qualified animal. Only 4-Hers who have two Grand Champion 4-H and /or Reserve Grand 4-H Champion Animals may sell two animals in the livestock sale. (For example, if a 4-H member has the Grand Champion 4-H Steer and the Reserve Champion 4-H Lamb, he/she may sell both animals). (Member who has the Grand Champion 4-H Turkey and a breed champion steer may only sell one animal). Animals consigned to the sale will sell only one time.

Sale order is determined by the sale committee and published prior to the sale with rotation of species and placings. Champions will sell first. Any exhibitor planning on donating portions or whole proceeds to charity, scholarship, or similar causes must notify the 4-H Sale Committee prior to the sale. The Sale Committee will place those animals in the sale order appropriately and may not sell where the animal ranked.

The animal sold in the sale must be the animal delivered to the buyer/processor. If a member wishes to keep an animal, they should not enter it into the sale. Exhibitors may not buy back their animal at the time of the sale; nor shall they ask their buyer for their animal to be donated back to them. Violations may disqualify the exhibitor from participating in future Laramie County 4-H sales.

General Rules: Exhibitors will be ineligible to sell if the following rules are not adhered too.

- Exhibitors planning on selling the 4-H Livestock Sale must attend one of the 4-H Livestock Sale Exhibitor meetings published in the Laramie County Fairbook schedule after arriving to Laramie County Fair.
- Exhibitors must complete applicable age division Quality Assurance Training provided by Laramie County 4-H prior to the sale.
- Exhibitors must accurately complete a sale consignment card prior to the sale. Cards will be available upon check in a Laramie County Fair.
- Exhibitors must complete a thank you card. It is understood that exhibitors may choose to send a personalized thank you card following the sale but it is required to complete a general thank you card prior to the sale for buyers.
- Exhibitors must have an official photo taken by the photographers on site with their designated sale animal. At the time of the photograph, exhibitors must bring their sale consignment card to the photographer. An official stamp will be placed on the card for later verification that the photo was completed.
- Exhibitors must turn in their stamped sale consignment card and general thank you note by 5:00 pm on Thursday, August 8th, 2024, to the 4-H Office at Archer. The 4-H office will provide exhibitors with a receipt that the consignment card and thank you note were turned in.
- Sheep and Beef exhibitors must turn in ownership papers to the brand inspectors Friday, August 9th, 2024 (location will be announced).
- Exhibitors are required to present their animal in the sale ring during the sale unless the exhibitor has been approved by the 4-H Sale Committee prior to the sale to be absent.
- Animals will be sold by the head rather than by the pound. According to standard auction procedure, a commission will be deducted from each consignors
 check to cover the cost of advertising, supplies, recognition of buyers and volunteers, etc. Commissions are:

2% Beef 5% Goats, Sheep, and Swine 10% Poultry/Rabbit

- Animals may be disqualified from the sale if the official judge, veterinarian, or committee recommends disqualification based on market readiness, health, or sale rule infraction.
- The 4-H Sale Committee will make arrangements for the delivery of the animals not reserved for State Fair following the sale. Every precaution will be taken for safe delivery; however, liability is changed to the buyer when sold.
- State Fair Animals once an animal is sold at the sale, it becomes the 4-H member's responsibility to transport State Fair animals to the designated processor on the predetermined dates following State Fair. Delivery dates will be published in the sale book on sale day. All resale animals reserved for State Fair are to be delivered to LCCC the day they are released from State Fair.
- Any question about the 4-H Livestock Sale after fair should be directed to the sale chairman and the 4-H Educator.

Red Angus- Solid red (shades may vary), polled, blonde, light red or mixed switch, may have black hair on tail, muzzle, face, neck, or legs. No white above the navel

Hereford- Some white on the back of both ears, red body with white face, white underline, and white-marked legs, traditional feather on crest. Horned Herefords must show evidence of dehorning. Herefords may be dark red in color, have a red neck, solid red ears, excess white on legs or above underline, eye pigment, black hair in tail or ear, or freckling on the nose.

Maine Anjou/Maine Anjou Cross- Can be dark red and white, black, solid red or black and white. May have white patches on the head, tail, underside, and legs. May be horned or polled.

Shorthorn- Solid red or solid white with red hair or red pigment on ear, muzzle, anus or tail or any combination of red and white with the red and white color pattern bleeding together.

AOB English Cross- Any cross breed of following breeds: Galloway, Hereford, Shorthorn, or British breed. Can vary in color and markings but will be smaller framed.

AOB Continental Cross- Any cross breed of following breeds: Limousin, Simmental, and Continental breed. May vary in color and markings but will be larger framed.

Charolais- Must physically appear with breed characteristics of a half-blood Charolais. White, yellow gray, or silver (moderate dappling allowed, minimal painting or spotting. Skunk tail, line back, baldy.

All rules and expectations for 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Cat Show.

- The "Household Pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.
- A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.

- All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must also bring cage or carrier for their cats/kittens.
- All exhibitors MUST wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with pants or skirts. No shorts allowed.
- All presentations will be held to a 5–7-minute time limit. Please plan accordingly.

Health Requirements

Cats must have current rabies and distemper, and feline leukemia shots are strongly recommended. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required. Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

Rules and Regulations

- 4-H members qualify to enter the State 4-H Dog Show by showing in their county 4-H dog show AND:
- Showmanship youth competed in showmanship at county fair or the county 4-H Educator approved the youth.
- Obedience received a qualifying score of (170) or above.
- Rally received a qualifying score of (70) or above.
- Agility received a qualifying score of (75) or above.
- 4-H members participating in the dog project may use co-owned dogs (owned by the immediate family). The member must have sole care, training and showing
 of that dog for the current 4-H year.
- **Ownership**: The dog lives in the same residence with the 4-H member and is owned by the 4-H youth or immediate family member (grandparents, mother, father, brother, sister). Any other living situation must be approved by 4-H Educator.
- **Co-Ownership:** Ownership ID Sheets extend beyond the family with two or more names on the papers to prove co-ownership exists. One of the names on the ID Sheet must be the 4-H youth or an immediate family member.

- **Dog Training Contract**: The 4-H member may enter into an agreement to train someone else's dog in situations that may benefit the member, the dog or both. This arrangement is used for families with the inability to own a dog. **The training contract should not be used as a substitute for normal dog ownership.**
- All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the County 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes. Dog ID forms should reflect the age of the dog.
- Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate.
- All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. County Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the site of the dog show. Once the 4-H dog show is completed, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.
- Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- Bitches in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will run at the end of each class.
- Spayed, monorchid, or neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- · Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

Obedience

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- The first-year class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first-year beginner novice class only once.
- An exhibitor who competes in the A groups with their first dog stays in the A groups with that dog for each level. The same is true for the B groups and levels. A member advances from On Leash A to Novice A. Same applies for moving in B classes.
- B Groups are classes for all additional/second dogs entered after first dog.
- A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three
 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show must show the dog by these guidelines:
 - o Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level
 - o Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3
 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back down to the lower level with the same dog.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- All dogs must enter/leave the show ring on a leash.
- Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.
- Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.
- Class A and B may be combined at discretion of Superintendent(s) based on entry numbers.

Conformation

- All dogs must enter/leave the ring on a leash.
- Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class if numbers warrant. First place winners in classes 12-21 will compete for the Best in Show trophy in conformation.
- Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county, if possible), if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- Classes 012-019 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred both animal parents of the same breed.
- Classes 020-021 are for cross-bred dogs-parents of different breeds and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics.

Agility

- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3
 qualifying scores. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.

- The goat will be scanned and the ultrasound data will be entered and processed by the computer software.
- The animals meeting all of the following criteria will be placed, and then animals missing only one criterion will be considered, and so on. Market Goat Ultrasound Standards:

Live Weight (LW)- 50 lbs (minimum)
Fat Thickness- .10 inches to .25 inches
Loin Eye Area (LEA)- 2.0 square inches (minimum)

The Primary ranking will be based on ADG and Loin Eye Area/100 lbs, and use a composite ranking.

HORSE SHOWS

The mission of Laramie County 4-H Horse Committee is to provide educational opportunities to improve horse members knowledge and skills throughout the year.

ALL STATE FAIR ENTRIES ARE DUE TO THE EXTENSION OFFICE TUESDAY, AUGUST 6, 2024, by 12:00 pm (NOON). NO EXCEPTIONS!!

To verify entries at your event, please bring a copy of your ShoWorks online entry receipt or a copy of your verified paper entry to check-in ABBREVIATED FROM THE WYOMING JUNIOR HORSE SHOW RULE BOOK, MOST CURRENT EDITION.

- All classes shall be conducted according to rules contained in the current "Laramie County 4-H Horse Policy and Procedures Manual."
- · Safety helmets properly fitted are accepted and encouraged in any class for headgear. ASTI-SEI helmets recommended.
- Members must wear long pants, boots, long sleeved shirts, and hat/helmet.
- Members may only have one (1) entry in Showmanship or any performance class.
- Members will only be paid premiums for up to three (3) halter classes.
- ALL members must have Horse Safety Testing paperwork on file and successfully completed, including endorsements, at the County Extension Office by the
 required deadline as advertised by the 4-H program to participate at the Laramie County 4-H-FFA Horse Show.
- Endorsements must be passed to participate in the following classes:
- Halter class members must pass section 1 and 2A of the certification.
- Rail and performance classes require members pass section 2B of the certification to ride.
- · Trail endorsements for the Trail Class.
- · Speed endorsement for all stock and speed classes to include goat tying, working cow and cow sorting.
- · Roping endorsement for all roping classes.
- · Jumping endorsement for Hunter Hack.
- 4-H members must prepare and groom their own animal for any/all classes.
- All horses must have a current vet health inspection to be allowed on the grounds. It is strongly recommended that all horses be current on immunizations.
 Horses must be sound and in good body condition to compete.
- Arena Management
 - There shall be a ring steward for each judge, and he/she shall be the ONLY person allowed in the ring with the judge in all classes.
 - Parents and exhibitors are NOT allowed to address a judge. Questions need to be addressed to the gate attendant.
 - No 4-H exhibitor will receive aid from any person outside the show ring while showing.
- ***Disqualification may result at the discretion of the officials, the fair superintendent, or the Laramie County 4-H Educator.
- 4-H and FFA members cannot use the same horse for both projects. A separate horse is required for each organization.
- The 'family horse' is defined as one horse that can be shown by members of the direct family (siblings ONLY).
- Each member must be safety certified and endorsed in each event entered to compete on that horse.
- The horse may only be entered in one event, i.e., the horse can run once with Exhibitor A for barrels and once for Exhibitor B in poles but cannot run for both events for both exhibitors.
- Contestants must have their numbers pinned securely on their back or BOTH sides of the saddle pad.
- If a contestant foresees a possible conflict in showing two or more halter horses, they must have another 4-H member prepared to show one of the horses. Halter classes will not be delayed for a 4-H member who is showing in one ring when his/her class is called for the other ring.
- If for any reason an exhibitor cannot use the horse that was pre-entered for Fair, they may substitute another horse with Superintendent permission and pass all safety certifications to show in those pre-registered classes.
- There will be a final 5-minute call before each class. A five (5) minute tack change will be allowed between classes if necessary. However, the ring steward or gate person MUST BE NOTIFIED of necessary changes. 4-H members will be denied entry if not present for last call into the ring,
- If a horse kicks (or is known to kick), a red ribbon must be tied to its tail for the safety of all. The judge shall not discriminate against the horse. If any horse is
 deemed too dangerous for the rider or others, the superintendent along with the 4-H Educator, and/or show judge, has the right to dismiss the horse for the
 remainder of the day or the remainder of the horse show.
- Only exhibitors and their project horses are allowed on the grounds during the horse show.
- Only exhibitors may ride, groom, warm up, etc. project horses on the grounds during the horse show.
- Any person having a grievance or complaint shall submit a written signed statement to the 4-H Horse Show Superintendent and 4-H Educator for
 investigation. The statement shall include all facts to clearly explain the case. Grievances must be submitted within 24 hours after completion of the Laramie
 County Horse Show.
- Foul language, verbal abuse of Fair Officials, insubordination or cheating will not be tolerated.
- 4-H members who do not exhibit or conduct themselves in a sportsman-like manner may be dismissed from the ring and/or forfeit all premiums.

AWARDS

- Clinic participation is required to be eligible for Overall Awards given by the 4-H Horse Committee.
- Halter horse points do not count toward ANY high point awards.
- Showmanship is not a divisional class but may be a consideration toward the Overall Awards.
- Tiebreakers for all events will be most firsts, most seconds, etc.
- Sportsmanship awards seek to recognize member's support of others, as well as quality and kind horsemanship.
- Most Improved Horse and Most Improved Rider are considered for members showing two or more years.

Conclusion of County Fair Horse Show

All stalls must be cleaned, and exhibitors must check out with the Horse Superintendent within two (2) hours of show completion. Unclean stalls will be assessed a \$20 cleaning fee, per stall, to be withheld from fair premium checks All horses must leave following the close of the show.

- All Pocket Pets are to be brought in the day of the show and taken home upon completion of the competition.
- Pets must be confined to a portable Escape Proof Cage, suitable for that particular species, while they are on the Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must provide their own cages. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide for the health and welfare of the animal while it is at the fair. Where appropriate, harnesses are required.
- Exhibitors will be asked to discuss and have knowledge of their pet and may be asked to handle their pet at the judge's discretion.
- Any pet showing signs of illness will be removed from the grounds immediately at the discretion of the Show Superintendent.
- Exhibitors are required to be with their animals at ALL TIMES.
- Animals must be owned by the Exhibitor by July 1.
- Classes will be broken accordingly at a natural basis by the Show Superintendent.
- Presentations may be up to 5 minutes long, but not to exceed that time limit. Handling skills and habitat and information may be demonstrated.
- The Pet Rock class is a fun class and will not be eligible for Champion Pocket Pet or showmanship.

Cage and carry birds will be inspected the morning of the show.

State Veterinarian may ask for permission to take a mouth swab from random birds to test for Avian Influenza.

Check out will follow the conclusion of awards.

Anyone who needs help figuring out which classes to enter should call the superintendent(s) prior to the entry deadline. If you need help with your project or preparing for Fair, please contact the superintendent(s) at least two weeks before fair.

Poultry Rules

- Only three entries per class will be allowed.
- Exhibitors will provide suitable equipment for birds to stay in the building during the show.
- Poultry not checked in during scheduled times will not be exhibited.
- All birds must pass the health inspection before they enter the building or are put in show cages.
- The health inspector for the poultry show has final say if a bird will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Birds with bare backs, unable to move normally, external parasites, or appear unthrifty will not be allowed on fairgrounds.
- Birds should be in adult plumage. Final determination will be made by the Superintendent.
- No poultry will be on the grounds that is not entered in a class
- All poultry except market animals must be part of the regular project prior to June 1.
- All birds must be able to be handled by the judge. Birds not able to be handled will not receive a placing.
- Pheasants, quail, and some other ornamental birds require permits from Wyoming Game and Fish to own. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be aware of and obtain all necessary permits from the proper regulatory agencies.
- All listed weights and ages are guidelines to follow, not limits.
- Judges will have the final determination on whether a bird is market ready or over finished.

It is acceptable for a Hampshire to have a black head with a white body, with evidence of pigment and freckling down the top, white belt starting on a front foot/leg, belt partially encircles body extending to at least the chest floor (half belt), or freckling in the belt.

Crossbred- Any animal that is a crossbreed of any of the listed breeds may be placed in this classification. Animals not fitting into their breed characters will be placed into the Crossbred class.

Spot- Must be black and white. May be predominantly black with white spots or predominantly white with black spots. Ears are down.

Any Other Breed- This may include Berkshires, Poland China, Landrace, or any other breed not listed. All breeds entered in this category will need to conform to their own breed characters and not fit into another breed classification.

Machinery with movable parts shall be rendered temporarily inoperative). It is the responsibility of the exhibitor and/or chapter advisor to make sure this is done.

- It is highly recommended that a Skill Summary Statement be attached to each entry. This can include a brief explanation of your project to help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others. Due to the absence of interview judging at State Fair it is highly recommended that this information be attached to all State Fair qualifying items. Food & Nutrition and Food Preservation projects have required information that must be attached to each entry. Details can be found in that project section. Contact the Extension Office for examples of skill summary cards.
- Posters, pictures, artwork, and photography exhibits should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboard following the WY 4-H Photography & Visual Arts Display Guidelines Brochure. If the items cannot be hung, they will be displayed on the floor or table as space allows. Items not displayed according to these standards may not be eligible for the Wyoming State Fair.
- Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table.
- Any exhibit that puts the safety of others at risk of injury or harm, as deemed by the 4-H Office, may not be allowed to be publicly displayed and/or judged.
- Oversized exhibits will be displayed as space permits.
- Static exhibits are judged by an interview judging process with an emphasis being placed on the learning process of the project area. Exhibits that are judged without the interview judging process are placed at the judge's discretion.
- Rules It is the responsibility of the exhibitor/family to know and understand all rules and regulations. Unless specified, exhibits must conform to the same rules and regulations that apply to other departments at County Fair.
- Entries must be exhibited at County Fair_to be eligible for the Wyoming State Fair. It is the Responsibility of the 4-H member/family and to enter exhibits/entries in the correct classes. Incorrect entries can be disqualified. Contact the 4-H Office if you have questions about classes.
- The Laramie County Fair or County extension staff will not be responsible for the loss of or damage to, any exhibit or animal.
- 4-H static exhibits are judged using the Danish system of placing (purple, blue, red, white). Entries winning a blue or purple will be eligible for Wyoming State Fair.
- In June, 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service involving 4-H and FFA youth was reviewed and amended to read as follows: "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For Example: 4-H and FFA members may carry the same type of supervised occupational experience program in vocational agriculture per as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from the supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project."
- A project done in school should be eligible for display or show through one, but only one organization.
- Members are allowed 8 entries in each class with no like items. Like items will be disqualified. Multiple entries can be entered in each class as long as the projects are distinctly different, however you must enter these classes multiple times on your fair entry form. Example: A Jr. aged division member is bringing cucumbers, beans, and tomatoes, to be entered for all three vegetables, this member must have three entries on their fair entry form for H-29-1. If you have questions please call the fair office, or the 4-H office.
- Interview judging may occur on three items per youth per project area. Additional items in that area will be set aside and judged later. For example, if an exhibitor has six photos, three photos (from any combination of classes) will be interview judged and the remaining will be set aside and judged later.

- All static exhibits going to State Fair will be transported by extension office unless prior arrangements are made with the 4-H Staff. If a member's item is fragile or breakable it is that member's responsibility to pack this item to go to State Fair on Monday, August 12th, 2024 between 7:30-9:00 AM. Multiple similar exhibits from the same exhibitor or exceptionally heavy or large items will be transported at the discretion of the Extension Office Staff. The Wyoming State Fair, State 4-H Office, and the County Extension Staff will not be responsible for the loss of or damage to, any article or animal. Photography and Visual Arts participants will be limited to taking 4 items of each project to Wyoming State Fair. After interview judging the participant will pick which entries they want to enter at Wyoming State Fair. Entries not chosen must be picked up Saturday, August 10th.
- Multiple entries can be entered in each class as long as the projects are distinctly different, however you must enter these classes multiple times on your fair entry form. Example: A Jr. aged division member is bringing cucumbers, beans, and tomatoes, to be entered for all three vegetables, this member must have three entries on their fair entry form for H-29-1. If you have questions please call the fair office, or the 4-H office.
- Static Exhibits not going to State Fair may be removed beginning at 3:00am Saturday August 8th. Items left after 5 p.m. will be disposed of.
- Perishable entries for State Fair need to be taken to the Event Center 4-H Office Monday, August 12th, 2024 between 7:30-9:00 AM to be transported to Douglas.
- No hazardous materials, dead or parts of a dead animal unless properly preserved, live ammunition or any exhibits that pose a health or safety concern are allowed. The County 4-H Office reserves the right to disqualify and dispose of any project considered a health/safety hazard or potential health/safety hazard.
- For additional 4-H specific rules and recommendations for County Fair and State Fair please refer to the County Fair Edition of the 4-H Newsletter or the 4-H Update Emails.
- To verify entries at your event please bring a copy of your ShoWorks online entry receipt or a copy of your verified paper entry to all contests and events.

FLORICULTURE GENERAL RULES:

- Three entries per class maximum.
- ALL FLOWERS EXHIBITED MUST HAVE BEEN GROWN IN WYOMING BY THE EXHIBITORS No silk or plastic flowers. The superintendents in charge of this department shall have the right to remove, at any time, from display, exhibits or parts of exhibits that have become unsightly. However, exhibitors are welcome, and encouraged, to replace any wilted or damaged flowers after the first day. These changes will aid in keeping the entire floriculture department more attractive for the entire duration. Flowers should be well preserved in transit. For longer lasting display, flowers should be cut early in the morning, or after sundown the previous day, with the longest stems possible, including the foliage. Place in cool area, in tepid water, for a minimum of 4 hours (preferably overnight), to completely harden. A sharp knife is best for cutting, making a diagonal cut on the stem (to allow as many plant cells as possible to be exposed) thus permitting the flowers to absorb a great deal of water.
- Entry tags must be securely attached to each exhibit by the exhibitor before exhibits are entered. Any method may be used to attach tags to entry as long as the tag remains flat and QR code is visible. Rubber bands are prohibited.
- Exhibitors must furnish containers in proportion to size of bloom. Containers for cut flowers are to be clear glass or plastic bottles and jars, or clear glass or plastic inexpensive vases (free of labels), (No artificial material of any kind is allowed including plastic, Styrofoam, artificial flowers, or foliage). Wedging is allowed. Entries must be the sole creation of the exhibitor. After flowers are conditioned, no foliage should be in water.
- Artistic arrangements only fresh or dried, dyed or treated natural plant material may be used in artistic arrangements. No artificial material will be allowed
 within arrangements. Foliage, accessories, and bases may be used as desired. The arranger need not have grown flowers used in arrangements; however,
 arrangements must be the sole creation of the exhibitor. The committee will exercise all care but will not be responsible for loss or breakage of containers or
 accessories.
- Best of Show can only win once every 3 years.
- All Laramie County residents are urged to participate in the Floriculture division to make this a "Laramie County-Wide" exhibit. First time exhibitors may be given some assistance by the superintendents in preparing their entries to meet Floriculture rules. Potted plants and planters MUST have been the property of the exhibitor for at least three months before the Fair. All plants MUST be named.
- In close decisions named and/or newer varieties will be given preference for awards.
- Only judges, superintendents and clerks will be allowed in the Floriculture section during judging.
- Make sure flowers, not the accessories, are the focus of your arrangement

- Floriculture exhibits will be judged on-Cultural perfection (form, color, substance, foliage, stem, and size according to variety) 60 points, Distinction of variety 20 points, Condition 20 points
- Age as of August 1st of current year.

HORTICULTURE GENERAL RULES

Three entries per class maximum.

All fruits and vegetables must be clean. The following information will aid in preparing vegetables for exhibit:

- Asparagus It should be fresh, tender, and firm, with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost their entire length and taper uniformly. Each should be the same size in diameter at the butt and in length.
- Beans, Snap Green and wax beans should be clean, firm, crisp and free of blemishes. Long straight pods of the same length and color should be selected. The ends of the pods should not be broken, and the seed should be about half grown.
- · Beans, Lima -Lima bean pods should be well-filled, clean, fresh and a dark green color. They should be uniform in color, shape, and size.
- **Beets, Table** Diameter should be 2 to 2 1/2 inches. Side rootlets should be removed but tap root should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size. Tops trimmed, leaving 1 inch of leaf stalk above crown.
- Broccoli Heads should be uniform in dark green color; condition and size should be compact, not less than 3 inches in diameter, and free from damage by
 disease, insects, worms, or wilting. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leaves to give an overall length of 5 inches.
- Brussel Sprouts -All the heads should be firm, compact, fresh, a good green color, and uniform in shape and size. Heads not less than 1 inch in diameter are desirable. Stems should be smoothly trimmed to 1/2 inch.
- Cabbage Heads should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape, and size, and should be firm, heavy in comparison to size, free from damage by freezing, disease or insect. Midribs should not be large, and the leaves should not be trimmed too closely. Leave stem 1/4 inch long to hold leaves firmly.
- Carrots Select carrots should be smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color and free from greening at the top. Specimens should be typical of their variety avoiding over-size, and should be free from side roots, cracks, or other damage. Cut off tops to 1 inch. Do not trim tap roots.
- Cauliflower White cauliflower should be white and other colors to include but not limited to green, purple, yellow and orange. Cauliflower should be solid, uniform, and close flowered and should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the green outside leaves to 1 inch above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain.
- Celery Stalks should be uniform in color and size. Trim outside stalks until color is uniform. The heart, which is made up of stocky inner branches, should be well developed. The outer leaves should be crisp, free from prominent ribs, splits and damage by disease and insects. Wash the plant until it is clean. Trim the root to a triangle-shape not over 1 inch long.
- Corn, Sweet Ears should be well-formed and filled out to tip, free from any kind of injury. Kernels should be soft, tender, and filled with thick, opaque, milky juice. Ears should be uniform in size and should be husked and trimmed for judging, free of silks. The shank should be trimmed to 1/4 inch from the base of the cob. The tip of the ear may be neatly clipped, although only a small portion (no more than 1/2 inch) of the cob should be removed.
- Cucumber, Pickling Specimens should be of the same size, not oversized and not more than 1 1/4 inches in diameter or 4 inches long and should be fairly straight with blunt ends. Clean by brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing the spines. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.
- Cucumber, Slicing Specimens should be straight, firm, uniform in color shape and size variety; not overgrown, but should be uniformly medium or dark green, 6-9 inches long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut the stem off to 1/4 inch.
- Eggplant Specimens should be smooth, firm, heavy but not too large, uniform in shape and size, for variety grown, free from blemishes, select for uniform coloring, free from bronzing and greening. Wipe with soft cloth. Trim stems to 1 inch.
- Gherkin, West Indian Separate from cucumbers, as the gherkin and cucumbers are different species. Avoid oversize, not more than 1 1/2 inches in diameter and not more than 3 inches long. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.
- Kohlrabi Specimens should not be hard, woody, or pithy. They should be 3 to 4 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumb nail. Clean but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to 1 inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.
- Lettuce, Head/Leaf- Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size and should be crisp, firm, clean, and free from damage. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves. Cut off the stem 1/4 inch from the bottom leaf.
- Muskmelon (Cantaloupe) Specimens should be the same variety, free from decay, cracks and any damage caused by insects, disease, hail or other means. They should be fully ripe, picked on full slip. If several days elapse between picking date and exhibit, they may be picked on half-slip and be permitted to ripen with stems attached.
- Onions Should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes but should not be less than 2 inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their papery skin intact. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. The tops (neck) should be small and trimmed to 1 inch. Green onions should be tender, medium sized stems with long, white shanks. Shanks should be smooth and uniform in size. Cut roots to 1/2 in. long. Do not peel heavily.
- Parsnips -Specimens should have firm roots and be smooth, tapering evenly; they should be small in diameter (1 1/2 to 2 1/4), without side roots and should be a light creamy color, with top root left on. Trim top to 1 inch.
- Peas Pods should be fresh, bright green and well-filled with tender peas. They should be uniform in color, shape, and size, with green calyxes attached, free from any kind of injury, such as insects, disease, or hail damage.
- Potatoes- should be clean (not scrubbed) and free of soil, uniformity of color, shape, and size. Free from insect or disease damage, no greening or growth cracks.
- Peppers Specimens should be the same variety, must be the same color and should be uniform in shape and size. Sweet green peppers should be healthy with no reddish blush or other discoloration. Sweet red or yellow peppers should have healthy, clear red or yellow color, with no greenish tinges. All peppers should be free from sun scald or damages caused by insects and diseases. Leave stem on and trim to 1 inch.
- Pumpkin, Pie Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from insects and mechanical injury. Do not wash, may be brushed clean. Leave stem attached and trim to 1 inch.
- Radishes They should be uniform in color, shape, and size. Flesh should be crisp and tender, not pithy, and be free from injury caused by disease, insects, growth cracks or mechanical damage. Trim leaf tops to 1 inch.
- Rhubarb Stacks should be uniform in color, shape, size, and texture. Length after trimming should be at least 10 inches. Stalks should be tender, crisp, fresh, not pithy, limp or wilted. Neatly trim the tops, leaving 1 inch of leaves and prongs. The stalks should be pulled when harvested, not cut off. The basal husks should be removed from the bottom of the stalk.
- Spinach Specimens may be harvested as entire plant with leaves left attached to the pinkish root crown. Leaves should be dark green from either the smooth or crumpled variety.
- Squash, Summer Pick when small (best eating 4 to 7 inches, depending on variety). The shell should be extremely soft, fairly tender, and have undeveloped seeds. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from damage or blemishes. Brush to clean off dirt, wash. Trim stem to 1 inch.
- Squash, Winter Pick when mature, when shells are hardened. Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from insect injury or mechanical damage. Brush to clean, but do not wash, Trim stem to 1 inch.

- Swiss Chard Specimens must be fresh, crisp, with bright green leaves and blemish free stems. They should be uniform in color and size. Clean by washing if necessary. Trim off roots and trim butt to a triangular shape.
- Tomatoes Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, and free from cracks, sun scald and blemishes, ripe, solid and without stems. Specimens should be true to type and variety. (Leave stems on the pickling or preserving types).
- Turnips Specimens should be uniform in size, shape, and color, medium-sized, 1 1/4 to 2 3/4 inches in diameter. Flesh should be crisp, fine grained and not pithy. They should be free of damage, clean and bright in color. They should be firm, with secondary rootlets removes, with 2 to 3 inches of tap root remaining. Trim tops to 1 inch.

- Entries may be black and white, color, sepia, or digitalized photographs captured on film. Sepias should be entered under black and white category. No slides, floppy, zip disk, or CD accepted. Photographs must be the work of the exhibitor.
- Photos may be taken with any camera including a digital camera and then entered in any of the categories: black and white, color, sepia or highly digitalized photographs captured on film. (See Highly Digitalized section for more information)
- The judges do not see the exhibitors name until after the judging because tags are folded and name is covered. Contestant should remove "claim check" section when entering.
- "Professional" refers to those whose work is/has been produced for the purpose of sale, or those who have a diploma, certificate, degree, or 3 or more years of school training or who teach in their media related to photography.
- "Amateur" refers to those who do not derive income directly from photography. The amateur generally does his/her photography for the pleasure involved and has had little or no photography training.
- Adults entering must enter as either professional or adult but not both. Grades K-12 may enter in both K-12 and adult.
- Photographs on exhibit may be sold by the artist but must remain in place until the Fair officially closes on the final Saturday of Fair. Items for sale must be tagged with a separate piece of paper stating the sale price and the name and phone number of the seller. The sale of the photograph is not handled by the Laramie County Fair, nor do the proceeds go to the Fair.
- If your photo has a frame and/or glass it is your responsibility to provide a secure hanging method. These photos are hung on a grid system with 1" S hooks, small zip ties, or binder clips.
- The Exhibit Hall Manager(s), Laramie County Fair Staff, Superintendents, and volunteers will not be responsible for any damages caused by insufficient hanging methods and damaged cause by such.
- No saw-tooth hangers.
- Pictures that are not framed may be mounted properly on mat board, mat framed, or foam board.
 - o Mat board is a solid thick layered paper pressed into a hard board.
 - o Mat framed board has the middle section removed creating a boarder around the photo.
 - Foam board needs to be thick and sturdy enough to handle photo
- Hanging methods: DO NOT USE masking tape or blue painter's tape. It is known to weaken in the humidity or heat of summer. Photos will fall.
- Judge(s) and/or superintendent will reclassify photographs into the correct class
- Classes may be combined or divided at the discretion of the judge(s) and/or superintendent.
- You are responsible to enter your photo into the correct category.
- Photos and ribbons must remain in place during Fair. Photographs must be picked up during the last Saturday of Fair. Any photograph not picked up by then or
 otherwise arranged with the superintendent will become property of the Laramie County Fair. You will need your computer entry tag stub to identify your entry
 and obtain your photographs and ribbons.
- Copyright Infringement of any type will not be allowed. If an outside medium is utilized or reproduced in any way by Photographer, written permission is required by originator.

DEFINITIONS OF CLASSES:

Abstraction - Abstraction occurs when a photographer focuses on a fragment of a natural scene, isolating it from its context. By zeroing in on the color,

texture, line, shape, geometry, symmetry, or reflection of a scene, that photographer warps our perception of the real world and familiar

objects.

Agriculture- Farm Life, ranch life, livestock, produce/production of crop and/or harvest, images of county and state agricultural activities

Architectural- Edifice made by man, rural, or urban

Black and White- Any image printed in black and white. Does include sepia.

Clouds- "Cloudscape-photography" capturing a body of clouds

Collection (sequence

of events)- A series of time-lapsed events taken at specific times depicting the change of said event(s)

images modified and/or altered dramatically using computer programs. (Sharpening, contrast, color toning, texture, enhancements,

graphic modifications, HDR, etc)

Farm Produce- Capturing images of farm crops growth or harvest

Prepared Food- Still life photography genre used to create attractive still life photographs of food. It is a specialization of commercial photography, the

products of which are used in advertisements, magazines, packaging, menus, or cookbooks.

Sports Action- Any image depicting a sport

Still Life- Inanimate subject matter, typically a small group of objects

Urban Scenic- Landscape or view (people, if present, must be part of the scene and not the subject of the photography)

General adoption of AQHA Rules and USEF Rules: The Current Official Rules and Regulations of the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) and United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) govern this Show and Gymkhana, except as otherwise stated within this document.

Conflicts in Rules: Whenever a conflict exists, LCF Open show rules shall apply.

Gate Call: For all events, there is a 2-minute gate call. After 2 minutes the gate will be closed. If the contestant is having trouble entering the gate, they have an additional 1 minute, and may be offered assistance.

Horsemanship regulations and disqualifying infractions:

All eliminations, dismissals, and disqualifications will be at the discretion of a judge and/or show officials, and the decision is final. Contestant will not be entitled to a refund for any class.

Age of a Horse: The age of the horse will be based on all horses having a January 1 birth date.

Animal Welfare: Every horse, at all times, is treated humanely and with dignity, respect, and compassion. Speed Event Safety and Information

- 1. A safety helmet (ASTM/SEI certified) is highly recommended for use when competing in speed events. However, if a contestant is wearing a Western hat, some method of restraint must be used to ensure the hat does not come off. Hats are optional for all speed events.
- 2. A horse will enter an arena the quickest and safest way whether it is led or ridden; however, after a horse and rider are in the arena, all gates will be closed and the rider will complete the pattern.
- 3. Acceptable western attire must be worn.
- 4. For speed events the using of a hackamore or other type of bridle is an option; however, an event official, or a judge may prohibit the use of bits or equipment he or she may consider severe or inhumane. Contestants have the option of using a tie-down.
 - The judge or show official will be allowed to eliminate an entry or call a no time if either the rider or horse:
 - a. Fails to begin the pattern within two minutes after arena entry and gate closure.
 - b. Falls while riding the pattern.
 - c. Displays any kind of cruelty whether or not it is specifically mentioned in the rules.
 - d. Crosses the finish line before completing the prescribed pattern.

- 8. Teams will be allowed 30 minutes to work on their animal in preparation to show. A ten-minute warning will be given. At the end of the 30-minute allotted time, all equipment is to be turned off, laid down, and all work stopped.
- 9. All animals must be wet at the beginning of the competition.
- 10. There will be two (2) judges with proven beef cattle fitting experience. Judging will be based upon skills demonstrated to prepare the animal: (a) teamwork; (b) accepted use of equipment; (c) handling of the animal; (d) quality of end result. NOTE: In case of a power outage in one or more chutes, a horn will be sounded and all work shall halt for all teams.
- 11. Each team will present their animal to the judges at the completion of the allotted time.
